Condon inks four Ag spikers for '85

The Texas A&M volleyball team had an easier task than most when recruiting season rolled around.

Losing just two players from last year's 33-4 team, Head Coach Terry Condon only needed to fill the vacancies.

Condon went out and found four players capable of filling those two voids.

Kelly Gaughn, a 5-foot-10 middle blocker from Glen Ellyn, Ill., Kelli Kellen, a 6-2 middle blocker from Conroe, Cheri Steensma, a 5-10 outside hitter from San Ramon, Calif. and Dena Zalesky, a 6-0 middle blocker from Lodgepole, Neb. make up this year's recruiting list.

Condon seemed pleased with the signees.

"I got the recruits I was after," Condon said. "They should give us a better nucleus of starters and more bench support. All our recruiting was positive. Everyone came in and gave us a look which is a step in the right direction."

Gaughn, a two-time All-State selection at Glenbard High School, said the choice to attend A&M was an easy one.

"It was just a feeling I had," Gaughn said. "When I visited the campus, I knew it was the place for me. I loved the campus and the people."

"Going to A&M is a dream. My hope was set on A&M all along. I felt like saying yes the first time I talked to the coaches there. When you think of the top teams, A&M is one of them."

Gaughn said she is looking forward to her career at A&M.

"I told my coach I was ready to drop out of high school and start college," Gaughn said. "I have been wearing my A&M shirt around school."

"I'm not expecting to go in and start right off. Your freshman year is a learning experience. I'm sure going to work hard and contribute where ever I can."

Kellen was an All-Star selection by the Texas High School Coaches' Association and made All-District at Conroe High School.

Since her brother currently attends A&M, the choice for Kellen was also an easy one.

"I planned on attending A&M all along," Kellen said. "I've always been taught there's no better place than A&M."

Did she ever question the Aggie interest in her?

"Yeah," Kellen said. "I was hoping, I was really skeptical that could play on their level."

Kellen was impressed with the Aggie coaches and players.

"The coach (Condon) seems a like the coach I have now," Kellen said. "All the players were real nice. The girl I stayed with, Mary ret (Spence), was real neat."

Kellen said she would also look forward to her freshman year as a learning experience.

"There are a lot of things I have work on to play at the level they do," she said.

Zalesky, who was All-State two and a member of the Nebraska Senior National team, also has a brother who attends A&M.

"My brother goes to grad school there, so that's where I found out about the school," Zalesky said. "It wasn't an easy choice until I visited there. After my visit, I had my mind made up."

As for her position on the team, Zalesky said she will have to wait and see how things work out.

"I'll try as hard as I can," she said. "I don't think I will be starting right off. I will try to work up to that as soon as I can. I guess we'll just have to wait and see what happens."

While Steensma didn't have a brother at A&M, she does have Texas ties. She lived in Dallas for four years and has a brother who lives in Weatherford.

The All-District selection narrowed her prospective schools to three: A&M, San Jose State and Arizona. A visit to the A&M campus narrowed the list to one.

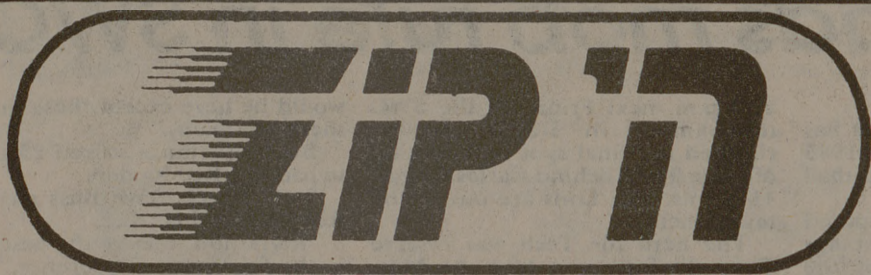
"I liked the atmosphere, the spirit and the tradition," Steensma said. "I also liked the players and coaches. I was interested in going back to school in Texas whether I played volleyball or not. The only thing I didn't like was the distance."

She said she's not ready to leave home yet, but when the time comes to start summer practice, she will be ready.

A starting position is not out of the question.

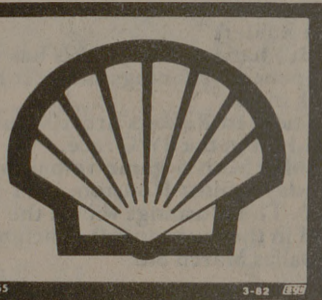
"I'd sure like to give it a try," she said. "I will give it my best shot. I will have to work for a starting position, but I'm willing to do that."

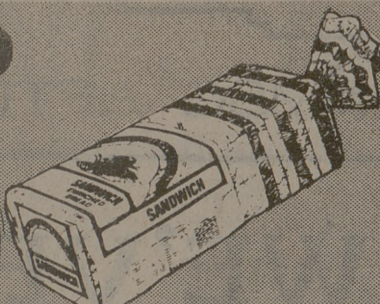

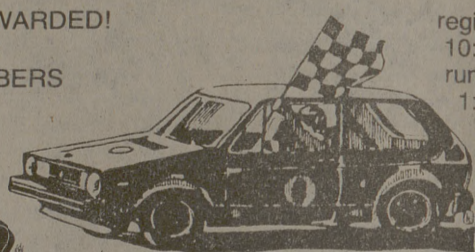
