College Station police usually deal with homeless people only when they receive complaints, Sgt. Gary Norton says. Complaints usually

come from area restaurants, hotels and motels that are open 24-hours, "We don't have a problem simply

"We usually make contact with the individual and find out what their plans are," Norton says. "Most of the time, when the police deal with them, they'll tell you something."

When the person being questioned obviously has no plans, College Station police direct the individual to-the Mission, Norton said. "Sometimes, all it takes is direction," he said. "They'll ask, 'well, where can we go if we can't stay here?' and we'll direct them to the Mission."

Like the lobbies of University buildings, motels and all-night res-taurants, hospital lobbies are a tempting haven for the homeless.

Representatives from both St. Joseph Hospital and Humana Hospital report few problems with homeless people frequenting their lobbies. Spokesmen for both hospitals attribute their lack of problems to their se-


