

Final Four Forecasts



Redmen want a shot at 'whole ball of wax'

NEW YORK — Coach Lou Carneseca doesn't want St. John's to be just another Final Four team.

"I always wanted to get there," said Carneseca, who will be making his Final Four debut after 17 years of coaching. "But it's not enough to get there. You want to stay there. Now we have to go for broke."

"We want a whack at the whole ball of wax. A lot of people are so happy to get there, they forget why they're there."

St. John's, winner of the West Regional title, will run into a familiar foe in its semifinal at Lexington, Ky., Saturday when it meets Big East Conference rival Georgetown.

No. 3 St. John's won its first meeting this season with the top-ranked Hoyas, halting Georgetown's 29-game winning streak when the two played at Landover, Md., winning 66-65.

Georgetown avenged the defeat,

twice, the first time by 16 points at Madison Square Garden, and then by 12 points in the Big East Tournament finale.

Still, Carneseca remains optimistic.

"If you look at the last two losses, you can see that we were not beaten badly," Carneseca said. "We gave the games away. As much as they were good, we beat ourselves."

"We made mistakes. We may have concentrated too much on (Georgetown center Patrick) Ewing and forgot about the other guys."

At a news conference, the St. John's coach said he might leave center Bill Wennington alone on Ewing more this time.

"He's played him as well as anyone around, and maybe we should let Ewing get his bundle and concentrate on stopping the others," Carneseca said. "He's gonna get his anyway, right?"

Tigers can't stagnate in successes too long

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — Reaching the NCAA's Final Four is a dream come true for All-American Keith Lee and Memphis State, but the Tigers aren't letting success interfere with preparation for the next two games.

Before his team's workout Tuesday, the 6-foot-10 Lee said, "We're just going over the basics because at this time of the year, sometimes you forget things like that. We're not up tight or anything like that. We're just trying to keep sharp."

The Tigers, winner of the Metro Conference title and possessing a 31-3 record, meet Villanova Saturday in the first game of the tournament's semifinal round in Lexington, Ky.

Lee, the West Memphis, Ark.,

scoring machine who has led the Tigers to four consecutive trips to the NCAA tournament, said he was sure he and his teammates eventually would make it to the Final Four after losing in the round of 16 for three years.

Lee is averaging 19.9 points a game, despite frequent foul trouble in the past four games.

"I knew we were going to do it," Lee said. "I wanted to play for the championship team. I knew when we started the season that we could do it. We had a lot of experienced players and we had some freshmen who could play."

"The bench — having a lot of younger players who could come in — really helped out a lot. We've got a lot of talent on our bench."

'Cats end celebration, start thinking semifinal

VILLANOVA, Pa. — The Villanova Wildcats, bleary-eyed from an early-morning pep rally welcoming them home from the NCAA Southeast Regional, began preparing Monday to meet Memphis State this weekend in the Final Four.

"Actually, I got to bed pretty late, because of my friends and the celebrating," said senior center Ed Pinckney, who had nine points and seven rebounds in Villanova's 56-44 victory over North Carolina in the Southeast regional final in Birmingham, Ala., Sunday.

Seniors Pinckney, forward Dwayne McLain and play-making guard Gary McLain are the nucleus of the team. The three made a pact in their freshman year that they would reach the Final Four.

"When you realize you might be playing the last game of your college

career, you play a little bit harder and try to assert yourself more," Pinckney said. "You don't want to make any mistakes at all."

Coach Rollie Massimino, who has guided the 'Cats past Dayton, No. 2 Michigan, Maryland and North Carolina so far in the tournament, smiled when he recalled the scene at the Field House.

"It was a mob scene," Massimino said. "There were 5,000 people, at least, in this gym that only seats 3,200."

Massimino, whose teams had lost in the regional finals three times before reaching his first Final Four, said he had seen "a little bit" of videotape of Metro Conference champion Memphis State, 31-3.

"I think they're a great basketball team with outstanding players," he said. "It's going to be very difficult, like all our games, but we've beaten some pretty good teams."






