Fund loss threatens boys' home

IRVING - The only public group home in the state for mentally retarded and emotionally disturbed boys ages 12 to 18 is threatened by a loss of Medicaid funds, officials say.

The 14-bed La Mancha home has relied on the federal funds for seven years and the money accounted for 66 percent of its budget.

James Craft, executive director of the Dallas County Mental Health and Mental Retardation Center, said the future of La Mancha is dismal without the money.

After the Texas Department of Health notified the home that it no longer qualifies for Medicaid, the local center's board of trustees has voted to keep La Mancha going as long as it can on a month-to-month basis

Craft was critical of the funding cutoff

"I find it rather ironic that in a state that is as blessed as Texas that we can't make a commitment to any of our social programs," he told the Dallas Times Herald.

Meanwhile, mental health officials worry about what will happen to the residents if La Mancha closes.




