## Landmark to be site for school

**SAN ANGELO** — San Angelo school trustees have voted to build what is believed to be the first public school in the country to be on a National Historic Landmark.

The school board voted unanimously Tuesday night to approve building a new Fort Concho Elementary School that will include a re-creation of the Fort Concho post hospital.

"We believe that this will be the first public school anywhere in the United States built with public and private funds," said Barbara Hesse, president of the Fort Concho Museum Board. "We know that it is the first public school to be operated on a National Historic Landmark."

The \$1.25 million school-hospital construction project is to be jointly funded with \$250,000 from the school district, \$250,000 from the city of San Angelo and \$750,000 raised privately by the museum board.

Hesse said the construction will combine several goals — a new school in Fort Concho; the razing of the present school on the fort's parade grounds, which was built in 1909; and the re-creation of the post hospital, which burned down several decades ago.

She credited museum director John Vaughan with the "very creative idea" of combining school and hospital projects into one.

Vaughan proposed placing the school a few hundred feet from its present location and, at the same time, re-creating the post hospital.

The hospital will house the school's administrative offices, with the nearby classroom building outside the original perimeter of the frontier fort but within the historic landmark area.

Today's highlight in history:  
On April 4, 1968, civil rights leader Martin Luther King Jr. was shot to death in Memphis, Tenn.

In 1841, one month after his inaugural, President William Henry Harrison succumbed to pneumonia, becoming the first chief executive to die while in office.

In 1850, the city of Los Angeles was incorporated.

In 1902, British financier Cecil Rhodes left \$10 million in his will to provide scholarships for Americans at Oxford University.

In 1969, a surgical team in Houston led by Dr. Denton Cooley implanted a temporary artificial heart

in 47-year-old Haskell Karp while waiting for a human donor heart to become available. Karp died April 8, one day after receiving a human heart.

In 1974, Hank Aaron of the Atlanta Braves tied Babe Ruth's home-run record by hitting his 714th round-tripper in Cincinnati.
