Excuses for late taxes abound

Auditor has heard everything

HOUSTON — An Internal Revenue Service auditor says she's heard just about every excuse imaginable when it comes to tax records and this tax season won't be any different.

Tanayia Huschka, 39, has audited thousands of people in the seven years she has worked for the IRS in Houston. She has heard creative excuses for misplaced financial records, has seen people cry and probably has heard every swear word invented.

'If it rains an inch in this town, 90 percent of the records were on the floor and ruined," Huschka

Most people aren't out to cheat the government, but they just know too little about the legality of some deductions, she says.

The IRS audits about 1 percent of the individual returns filed each year, so the chances are good that a wage earner will be audited sometime, Huschka says.

The suspect returns are sent to IRS offices and taxpayers receive letters notifying them they must bring their records for a certain tax year to the IRS, she says.

A common violation made is

claiming street clothing as uniforms, she says.

A maitre d' tried unsuccess-

fully to claim the cost of his tuxedo as a business expense, swearing to Huschka that it had become so stained with spaghetti

sauce that he couldn't wear it anywhere outside of work.

Then there was the exotic dancer who tried to show that her G-strings and tassels were legiti-

mate business expenses.
An audit usually lasts two hours and doesn't necessarily end in a penalty for the taxpayer. Often Huschka finds the tax paid was too much and a happy tax-payer walks out of the office with a refund.

It takes a certain mettle to be an auditor, she said. After years of hearing excuses, she has a "jaundiced eye" and it takes a good story to convince her to reconstruct missing records.

It also takes more than manure to get her to not look at records. One man brought his records in

empty manure bags, she says.
"I bet he never thought we'd look at them," Huschka says. "But

Investigation leads to more drug charges

MEXICO CITY - Ernesto Fonseca, reputed leader of La Familia drug trafficking empire, and 24 others arrested in the investigation of the kidnap-murder of an American narcotics agent, were ordered Mon-day to stand trial on a variety of drug and weapons charges, the judge hearing the case said.

The action by Federal Judge Jesus Arzate Hidalgo brings to at least 40 the number of people ordered to stand trial in the case.

They include reputed drug baron Rafael Caro Quintero, thought to be another La Familia leader, and mentioned by Mexican and U.S. officials as a key figure in the slaying of Drug Enforcement Administration agen Enrique Camarena Salazar, and a Mexican pilot who worked with him in Guadalajara.

The two dozen, arrested with Fonseca in Puerto Vallarta last Tues day, include current and form agents of the Jalisco state judicial police and two agents of the Federal Vol. 80 No. Security Police.

Under Mexican law, there is n jury trial and the defendants, if no eligible for bail, remain imprison while the judge takes up to a year to decide if they are guilty or innocent.



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
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
