He says people are "caught in a trap" because the police have the authority to determine that the person is too intoxicated to drive, but sober enough to decide whether or not to take the breath test. Vance says the person also has the right to talk to a lawyer within a "reasonable time" before taking a breath test. He says "reasonable time" has not been defined.

A person also has the right to demand a blood test to determine the amount of alcohol in his blood, Vance says. A blood test is more reliable than a breath test, he says. However, the person must pay for the blood test, which runs \$56.10 at St. Joseph Hospital. Humana Hospital does not give the test.

However, for a second offense, Vance says the person ought to hire a lawyer because a lot of things can go wrong.

Barron and Locke agree. Barron says, "The more complicated the situation is, the more you need an attorney."

Locke says, "There gets to be some pretty serious consequences."

If someone pleads guilty of a second DWI offense, he must spend at least 72 hours in jail if they plead guilty or if they are found guilty. His license also is suspended for one year. Vance says there is no advantage of probation because the person can't repeat the class to keep their license.

But Vance says a lawyer needs to negotiate jail time, the fine and the court cost. The lawyer's most important negotiation is to try to obtain an occupational driver's license for his client and do the necessary paper work.

Atlea law enforcement agencies are helping crack down on DWI arrests. Since December, the College Station Police Department has had a task force of two officers whose only job is to apprehend DWI offenders. So far, the task force has arrested 126 people for DWI.

The Bryan Police Department, the Department of Public Safety and the Brazos County Sheriff's Office use video equipment to record the person's actions. This can be used to prove the person was intoxicated.

Vance likes the video tape system. "A picture is worth 1,000 words," he says.

The College Station Police Department has video equipment but hasn't set it up. Vance thinks the College Station department should set it up because the department arrests more students than the other area departments.

side the cannister and be totally self-contained.

"NASA doesn't help," DeVore said. He added that the experiment must also pass a critical safety inspection before it can be put aboard the space shuttle.

"One mistake could ruin the project and possibly create a catastrophe," DeVore said. For instance, if the oxygen tanks that will aerate the fish explode, they could blast a hole in the space shuttle.

The entire project requires new and sophisticated equipment to be designed, Karrick said.

First, the tank that will hold the fish will have to be specially built so

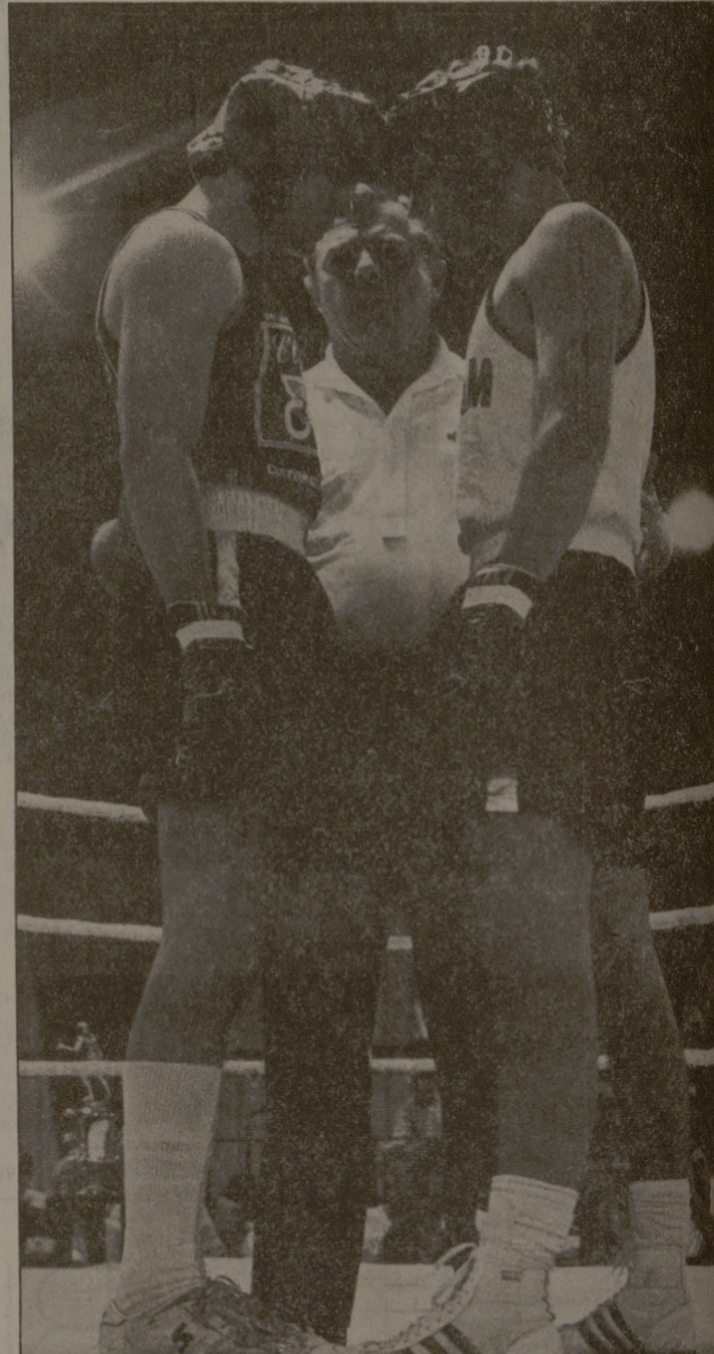

that a water current can be created to test how the fish orient themselves without gravity, DeVore said. The cylindrical tank must be leak proof so that it will not short-circuit the electrical system.

A video camera and video cassette recorder will document how the fish react to their new environment. Two types of lights, beta and mini-florescent, will be used to help record the action and to keep the fish from going into shock if they are exposed to bright light after a period of darkness.

On top of all this, the container must be tightly insulated to withstand the extreme temperatures in the space shuttle's cargo bay. The temperature ranges from about 300

degrees to minus 200 degrees Fahrenheit.

DeVore is designing a feeder system that will keep the fish alive while they sit on the launch pad, (which may be up to a month), plus the time to seven days that they will be in space.

He said fish previously have been sent on the shuttle in plastic bags but they did not survive.

DeVore and Karrick said they want to have better luck with their experiment so that they also can study how the fish reorientate themselves when brought back to earth.

Grievances meeting tonight

The last chance for students to express their suggestions and complaints to the Student Government will be at the Issues and Grievances Committee meeting tonight at 8 in the Commons Lounge.

Carol Ellison, the newly-elected vice president of student services for Student Government, said that in the past, the meetings have been held in Rudder Tower, but next year the meetings will be at numerous locations on campus.

"Next semester we will hold them (meetings) in different places around campus, like the A-1 Lounge," Ellison said. "We may

have some meetings outside Rudder from noon to 2 p.m. That way, students passing by will be able to stop and contribute to the meeting."

Tonight's meeting is important because the new Student Government officers will be there, including Sean Royall, the 1985-86 student body president, Ellison said.

"This meeting will give the new officers a chance to see how the Issues and Grievances meetings will be run for next year," Ellison said.

She said she hopes there will be a big turnout for the meeting. The meeting is the students' chance to inform Student Govern-

ment about the issues and policies they feel need to be changed, she said.

"We'll take notes and take into account the complaint," Ellison said. "Then we will investigate the problem and we'll try to change them if we can."

Student Government is trying to improve every year, she said, but student input concerning changes or improvements is the most important element of an effective Student Government.

"We really want to make a difference," she said. "Students can tell us what they don't like or what needs to be changed — we'll be there listening."

Nobel laureate to speak at A&M

A nobel Prize-winning chemist will discuss an economical way to produce hydrogen fuel from water today at Texas A&M.

Sir George Porter, director of the Royal Institution of Technology in Great Britain, will speak at the Hampton C. Robinson Lecture at 4 p.m. in 701 Rudder Tower.

Texas A&M, under the direction of Dr. John Bockris, recently

has been researching ways to obtain hydrogen fuel from water economically.

Porter received the 1967 Nobel Prize in Chemistry for his work on flash photolysis, the use of radiant energy from light that causes chemical changes by breaking down molecules.

Porter is a professor at the Royal Institute and holds a doctorate from Cambridge Univer-

sity. He later worked for British Rayon research and as a professor at Sheffield University.

The lecture series is named for Hampton C. Robinson, a Houston surgeon and businessman who helped initiate the hydrogen research group at A&M.

The lecture will be preceded by a reception for Porter at 3:30 p.m. in 107 Rudder Tower.
