professional, graduate and non-graduate students.

Gavras says, "The bottom line revenue. Lt. Gov. (Bill) Holt compiled figures with the assumption that no students would drop out of school and enrollment would be constant — history says there's a drop in enrollment."

Also, he says an installment for tuition payment will probably be put into effect enabling students pay their tuition in one, two or three installments.

Gavras says there is also a chance that students will have to be billed twice for the fall semester, once at the current rate and a second time for the difference caused by an increase.

Barton has made important contributions. They cover very important areas of chemistry, organic and otherwise.

"His theories changed the face of organic chemistry and taught us to think in three dimensions. The effect on the rest of chemistry and biology was so profound that his work has been used extensively to understand biochemical reactions and the structure and dynamics of DNA proteins."

During World War II, Barton helped the British military develop a special ink for undercover work. In recent years, he has made significant contributions in photochemistry and synthesis of tetracycline antibiotics.

Barton says his colleagues should be more broadly educated, even in their own field.

"I often say that a chemist goes into a hole, and then digs himself deeper and deeper," Barton says. "That's not the way science advances."

He has produced about 700 scientific papers, 13 in 1984 alone. He was selected as a Fellow of the Royal Society in 1954 and was knighted in 1972.

Among Barton's numerous awards and honors are the Royal Medal (given by Queen Elizabeth the first Davy Medal from the Royal Society, the Priestly Award from the American Chemical Society and honorary memberships in Japan's Order of the Rising Sun and France's Legion d'Honneur.

planned to automate or re-automate the administrative functions of admissions, student records, student accounting and financial aid.

Other Texas universities have similar systems already in use and give high marks to the performance of their computer systems.

Marvin Keith, associate registrar at Texas Christian University, says TCU has a campus-wide system of 350 IBM 4341's doing many of the functions envisioned in the Phase two plan at A&M.

The registrar's office has 10 terminals, Keith says. The system works similar to A&M's in that operators type in the schedule information and update the student's fee slip.

Keith says TCU has avoided many problems with the system because of the efficiency of the overall network. He says they have enough lines to allow for easy access to the system. And Keith gives some advice to A&M.

"It's a matter of a year of agonizing to work out the bugs," Keith says. "Any system needs a weeding out process to get used to a new system."

Don Wickard, registrar for Texas Tech University, says their system is similar to that of TCU, which has been expanded throughout the university.

Wickard says the 9-15 IBM 3178 terminals in his office handles registration for all the students at Texas Tech.

"The terminal (once the information has been entered into the system) comes back with either a confirmed or a closed message on the class," Wickard says. "If it is closed, we can seek out another section."

Wickard says the terminal operator can print out the schedule for the student, who will be billed by mail later.

There are additional terminals in the dean's office, departmental offices and financial aid, Wickard says.

When Texas Tech implemented the computer system in 1983, Wickard says they were concerned with the response time for the system.

"We had very few problems, the toughest part was just getting the word out of the great changes," he says.
