Silverado: another film in the westerns' revival

IRED OF STAYING UP LATE TO watch the old shoot-em-ups on the late show?

Have you seen "High Noon" so many times you can lip-synch the dialogue along with Grace Kelly and Gary Cooper?

Have I got good news for you, folks! Silverado is in town!

Not only has this slick little pictureshow got every cliché from every western you have ever seen, Lawrence Kasdan has rounded up a whole herd of top notch rising stars: Kevin Kline, Scott Glenn, Rosanna Arquette, John Cleese, Kevin Costner, Brian Dennyhe, Danny Glover, Jeff Goldblum and Linda Hunt to boot.

ET'S SEE HERE. WE HAVE four courageous good guys and a bunch of mean bad guys. We have two, count them, two quaint western towns, a wagon train, (unfortunately, no Indians to harass the settlers), a hideout full of scruffy robbers, two smokey saloons, complete with whores with hearts of gold, a shifty gambler, an unjust sheriff who has been bought by the rich and ruthless rancher who wants to run the poor settlers off their land, a posse of despicable deputies, and finally, a finale complete with a gunfight in the middle of the dusty, deserted street between the unjust sheriff and the knightly Kevin Kline.

All this and more packed into two hours and 13 minutes of a Dolby-enhanced root-'em-shoot-'em that will leave you feeling like you've been rode hard and put up wet.

Actually Kasdan (who wrote "Raiders of the Lost Ark," "The Empire Strikes Back," and wrote and directed "Body Heat" and "The Big Chill") had originally planned a big Indian scene but it was thrown out the picture's budget for Columbia to agree to produce it.

Another western, "Pale Rider," which was produced and directed by Clint Eastwood, was released early this summer.

Based on how well these two films do at the box office, other westerns may be on the way. Directors Ron Howard ("Splash," "Cocoon") and Howard ("Splash," "Cocoon") and John Carpenter ("Starman") are waiting for the public's response to 'Silverado" before making their own westerns.

Howard summarized the importance of "Silverado" in an interview in The Dallas Times Herald:

'Silverado' is really the one to watch. I think, if you like westerns, you've got to rush out and see it early and often. If people fool around and wait for it to come on cable, then the picture could vanish ... They should take a chance and try to enjoy it.

"Then if 'Silverado' is actually profitable, I think John Carpenter might have a chance to make his western, or maybe I'll get to do one.

ND "SILVERADO" IS DEFI-nitely worth watching. From nitely worth watching. From the panoramic landscapes (the film was shot in New Mexico) to the detailed authenticity of the saloons, your eyes will never get bored.

And, in fact, if I have one complaint, it is that there is too much in this film. It is a little too slick. Just as I was beginning to feel comfortable with a scene or the relationship between characters was beginning to warm, there would be an outbreak of violence and I would be whisked along to the next sphere of action.

But, all-in-all, the performances are good and even and the actions scenes are exciting. "Silverado" is a film all age groups should enjoy, a great family movie.
