But Texas Tech scored in the fi-nal seconds for a 21-17 victory over Tulsa, Arkansas nipped Mississippi 24-19 in their hard-fought regional rivalry, and TCU unleashed sophomore quarterback Scott Ankrom in a 30-13 victory over Tulane.

It was Tech's first non-conference victory outside the state of Texas

for it with impressive victories. Baylor fell 17-14 to Georgia on WTBS, Miami (Fla.) bombed Rice 48-20 on Raycom Sports, and Texas and, according to Hog coach Ken Hatfield, "was outstanding. He wasn't awed by anything and made

some critical plays." TCU Coach Jim Wacker said the wild night emphasized "the league is going to be crazier this year than it was last year. You realy have to be crazy to be a head football coach."

In games this week, Rice is at the Air Force Academy; Tulsa plays its third SWC foe in as many weeks by meeting Arkansas in Little Rock; A&M hosts Northeast Louisiana; Washington is at Houston; Missouri is at Texas; TCU is at Kansas State; Texas Tech entertains North Texas State; and Baylor makes the long West Coast trip to play No. 4 USC.

TCU trailed Tulane 13-10 at halftime but the Horned Frogs weren't about to disappoint a gathering of 31,512, largest non-conference opener crowd in the school's history.


Davis, who rushed for 152 yards, was praised by Tulane Coach Mack Brown.
