## San Diego's mayor convicted of perjury, conspiracy

SAN DIEGO — Mayor Roger Hedgecock was convicted Wednesday of 13 charges including conspiracy and perjury in a scheme to illegally finance his 1983 mayoral campaign. The verdict means he must forfeit his job as head of the nation's eighth-largest city.

The Superior Court jury returned the verdict midway through the seventh day of its deliberations in the mayor's retrial.

Hedgecock, 39, sat quietly with his hands folded on a desk next to defense attorney Oscar Goodman as the clerk read the jury's decision.

Under state and local laws, Hedgecock must give up the office when judgment is entered at sentencing, regardless of whether an appeal is pending. No date was immediately set for sentencing, which could include a prison term.

The 12-member jury received the case last Thursday following a two-month retrial.

Hedgecock was found guilty of 13 of the 16 charges against him, including the conspiracy count accusing him of plotting with political backers to funnel corporate money into his campaign.

The perjury counts stem from what prosecutors claimed were deliberate omissions on state political disclosure forms to cover up the campaign-financing conspiracy.

Prosecutors said more than \$350,000 was funneled into Hedgecock's 1983 campaign from the now-bankrupt J. David & Co., which laundered the funds through a political consulting firm.

Hedgecock said he was unaware that money from J. David & Co. funded the political consulting firm he retained for his 1983 campaign.

## NATO official says joint effort needed to control terrorism

DALLAS — Western democracies should cooperate more and take a more uniform approach toward terrorism, Peter Lord Carrington, NATO secretary general, said Wednesday.

The NATO official was here to address the Texas branch of the Atlantic Association, a non-profit American association promoting peaceful international relations.

"I think the free countries of the world have got to get together more than they have in the past," Carrington said during a news conference.

One difficulty with that, he said, is the idea that "one man's terrorist is another man's patriot." Not all nations look at terrorists in quite the same way in different circumstances.

However, Carrington said all nations should take the approach that "any country which harbors terrorists should have measures directed at it, which all free countries of the world must observe."

As an example, he cited the

United States halt of all commercial airline flights into the Athens airport after the hijacking this summer of a TWA jet that departed from Athens.

Such measures could help, he said, "but it's very difficult to see how you stop it absolutely."

Following the terrorist hijacking of an Italian cruise ship, most of the questions directed at Carrington centered on international terrorism.

"We've been rather successful at preventing a third world war," he said. "That is something. But we haven't prevented terrorism."

Carrington said that on his two-day visit to Texas, which began in Austin on Tuesday, he has been focusing his comments on the need to continue NATO.

He said the success of the 16-nation alliance is part of its problem today.

"People — the younger generation — are beginning to wonder what the alliance is all about," Carrington said.

So in his travels around the world

he tries to address that question. The title of his speech in Dallas was "Why NATO?"

Carrington's prepared speech said, "people forget what happened in Eastern Europe after the war and how weak Western Europe was at the time," causing them to question the need for NATO.

The other problems facing NATO, he said, are the growth of the anti-nuclear movement, particularly in northern Europe, and the NATO countries "falling behind" in conventional weaponry to the Soviet Union.

As for the recent visit of Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev to France, Carrington said Gorbachev will not be successful in creating a rift among NATO countries by seeking separate arms negotiations.

"It may be that Mr. Gorbachev thought it was a way of splitting the Europeans from the Americans, but it is not likely to be a very successful way of doing it," Carrington said.

## Mass funeral held for Puerto Rican flood victims; hundreds still missing

PONCE, Puerto Rico — Gov. Rafael Hernandez Colon joined hundreds of mourners in the city coliseum Wednesday for a mass funeral of many of the 68 known victims of this week's floods and mudslides. An official said as many as 500 more are feared dead.

Sobbing and wailing relatives and friends filed past the caskets of 23 of the 25 bodies pulled from the mud and debris of the nearby Mameyes shantytown, where a Monday morning landslide triggered by a tropical deluge destroyed 400 homes.

"This is the worst tragedy ever to hit our island in its history," Hernandez Colon said. "It fills me with pain, as governor and as a Ponce native."

Rescue teams working around the clock reported finding three more bodies under the Mameyes mud Tuesday night, bringing the unofficial count there to 28.

Ponce's deputy mayor, Angel Emeterio Atienza, estimated as many as 500 bodies are still buried in Mameyes. But Luis Armstrong, a deputy district attorney in charge of a temporary morgue at the site, said interviews with relatives and neighbors led him to believe up to 100 are still missing.

Col. Moreno said four U.S. Army Corps of Engineers demolition experts with sounding devices and six dogs trained to locate corpses were being flown directly to Ponce on Wednesday from Andrews Air Force Base in Virginia to help locate the bodies.

Police probing the waters under a collapsed bridge at Santa Isabela, about 20 miles east of Ponce, reported six automobiles and 19 bodies have been pulled from the swollen Paso Seco River.

Edgardo Delgado, the southern region's district attorney who supervises identification efforts, said 64 bodies had been received at the morgue at the medical center in Ponce, including victims from Ma-

meyes, Santa Isabela and other flooded areas on the south coast.

Delgado said rescue workers have spotted at least four more bodies under the mud and debris in various locations, bringing the known death toll to 68.

On Tuesday, Hernandez Colon declared three days of mourning and announced a multimillion-dollar emergency aid plan.

The governor also said he had talked with White House officials about obtaining technical help and federal aid for this U.S. commonwealth of 3.2 million people.

Jose Dapena Thompson, mayor of this Caribbean city of 190,000 people, urged President Reagan to declare Ponce a federal disaster area. He estimated damages in the southern region of the island will total "more than \$100 million."

The Puerto Rico legislature has authorized release of \$10 million in contingency funds for emergency relief, and Hernandez Colon said 40 municipalities were disaster areas. He said the top priority will be finding new housing for at least 2,000 homeless people.

## Three Mile Island Unit 1 reactor generating again

HARRISBURG, Pa. — The Unit 1 reactor at Three Mile Island reached 15 percent power Wednesday and began generating electricity for the first time since nuclear fuel melted in a 1979 accident at adjacent Unit 2, the plant's operator said.

The unit's turbine generator went "on line" at 4:02 a.m., when it was connected to a regional power grid serving Pennsylvania, Maryland and New Jersey, said GPU Nuclear Corp.

"This is a proud day for the staff of TMI-1, GPU Nuclear and the entire GPU system," said Philip Clark, GPU Nuclear's president and chief executive officer. "Unit 1 has returned to its vital role of producing lower-cost electricity for GPU's customers."

Unit 1 was restarted last Thursday, 6½ years after the nation's worst commercial nuclear accident.

The NRC approved restart last spring and last week the U.S. Supreme Court lifted a stay of restart imposed at TMI Alert's request.
