# A&M faculty urges delay in due date of fall class grades

The Texas A&M Faculty Senate voted Monday to recommend that the date, on which professors hand in fall semester grades, be delayed.

This would mean that students would not get their grades until January 1986, but Bill Rundell, chairman of the Senate's academic affairs committee, said the extension would give professors longer to review the examinations.

"(A professor) can't read 170 exams in 36 hours," Rundell said.

Rundell said if the due date was not postponed, professors may give multiple choice final exams or rush to grade exams.

"Almost regardless of the time it takes to get the grades out," he said, "we want to get the grades out properly."

The Senate's resolution suggested to President Frank E. Vandiver that professors be allowed to hand in students' semester grades as late as Monday, Dec. 23 instead of Saturday, Dec. 21, the previously scheduled due date.

Assistant Registrar Don Gardner told the Senate that if grades could

not be compiled by Dec. 21, they would not be processed before the staff's Christmas holiday.

In his opening remarks to the Senate, Speaker Jaan Laane said the executive committee has sent a letter to Texas Attorney General Jim Mattox to ask for an opinion on whether the state legislature's recent elimination of faculty sick leave was unconstitutional.

Laane said state Sen. Kent Caperton has requested President Frank E. Vandiver implement a policy of granting emergency sick leave until Mattox issues the opinion.

Also in his opening remarks, Laane said A&M will receive \$11 million of \$35 million allocated for the Texas Advancement of Technological Research Program. Laane said over half the funds awarded to A&M will go to the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

In other business, the Senate passed a resolution providing for the awarding of posthumous bachelor degrees to students enrolled in courses that would complete the degree requirements.

# Bad drinking water found in poor Texas community

SEAGOVILLE — For the 500 impoverished residents of the Sandbranch community in southeast Dallas County, unpainted shacks, mounds of uncollected garbage and the stench of hogs mixed with odors from a nearby sewage plant are a way of life.

But a recent discovery by public health officials has given the community's plight a new urgency. The only water available to residents is highly contaminated and unfit to drink, county officials say.

"I was appalled to see modern man surviving on this water," said David Lang, a bacteriologist for the Dallas County Health Department. "The types of bacteria there indicate the possibility of typhoid and dysentery."

County Commissioner John Wiley Price, who requested the test, says the power the county has in such areas is very limited.

As an unincorporated community, Sandbranch does not have zoning or health ordinances and county government does not have the authority to create such restrictions.

Residents say the water quality has decreased as the commercial activity increased. Lang said samples from Sandbranch wells revealed the types of bacteria found in fecal matter. He said this fecal matter may be the by-products of hogs grazing in the area.

Price and Rick Loessberg, Dallas County grants administrator, are trying to help Sandbranch residents create their own water district. A water district would be able to apply for state grants to raise the estimated \$315,000 needed to build a community well and filtration system, Price said.

But Loessberg has warned that the district, even if approved, may be too expensive for the residents to operate, with water service bills running as high as \$33 a month.

# Board delays setting of car insurance rates

AUSTIN — The State Board of Insurance on Monday delayed setting new automobile insurance rates for at least 10 days in hopes of getting new figures on effectiveness of the new safety belt law.

Board member Carol Rylander made the motion to reopen the hearing on Oct. 25 saying she believed there were newer statistics than those considered at a Sept. 19 hearing.

She said she would ask Col. James Adams, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, to be the first witness.

At the Sept. 19 hearing, the board's staff recommended a statewide 1.3 percent decrease in auto insurance for private cars, which would mean an overall decrease of \$35 million in premiums the next year.

Industry spokesmen asked for a 10.6 percent increase in rates, or a total increase of \$288 million in premiums the next year.

Rylander said the staff based its recommended insurance rates for the next year on an estimate that 50 percent of Texas motorists would use the seat belts while the industry estimated only 40 percent.

"I am convinced we can have a higher usage rate than either 40 or 50 percent," she said.

Rylander said any reduction of deaths and injuries in future years would be dependent on the compliance rate with our mandatory seat belt law.

The law became effective Sept. 1 but violators will not get tickets until after Dec. 1.
