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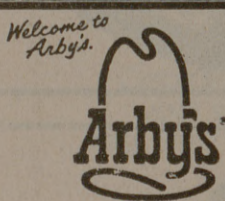

Condon's Ags ground Owls

A&M now ready for SWC showdown with Texas

In a little over a hour, the Texas A&M volleyball team went from thinking about the last place team in the Southwest Conference to talking about the first place team.

The No. 16 Aggies defeated Rice 15-7, 15-3, 15-7 Monday night in G. Rollie White Coliseum, but the players wanted to talk about Wednesday night.

That's when A&M (18-4, 4-1 in SWC) travels to Austin to take on No. 12 Texas.

"Now we're ready to think about Texas," A&M middle blocker Margaret Spence said. "In past years, we've started thinking about Texas too early in the season and that's hurt us. We've thought about Texas earlier this year, but in a different way than in past years."

But A&M Coach Terry Condon admitted that the Ags were thinking about Texas even during Monday night's match.

"Tonight we worked on the things we will use against Texas," Condon said. "Even in time outs, we said Texas does it this way, Texas does it that way. We even changed our defense to prepare for them."

An old saying is, "The best offense is a good defense."
The Aggies proved that statement true more than once against the Owls. A&M's defensive wall was solid as a rock.

A&M All-American Sherri Brinkman provided the bricks and setter Chris Zogata provided the mortar.

With the score 9-1 in the first game, Brinkman ran to the left and sent a Rice spike back over the net. Oops, the ball comes back to the right.

No problem.
Brinkman gets the block on the right. But Rice stays alive once more.

Tired of the game, Brinkman ends it with some offense. She slammed the ball down the net to the left, and it fell just inside the line.

The third game was more of the same, only the rallies were shorter. Three straight Brinkman blocks, nets three Aggie points.

"Sherri was eating them up on the front row," Spence said. "She was blocking them left and right."

The statisticians gave Brinkman three solo blocks and five block assists, but you can just about triple those numbers.

The Brinkman hands must be quicker than the eyes.

"We were just real calm," Brinkman said. "Sometimes we try too hard, that makes us jump early on our blocks. We just have to relax and play our game like we did tonight. We weren't roaming around with our heads cut off tonight. Sometimes we think too much and try too hard."

In between blocks, Brinkman even managed 11 kills and a .473 hitting percentage.

And when Brinkman wasn't doing damage to the Rice frontline, Zogata was.

Zogata was credited with one solo block and five assists and had six kills for a .333 percentage.

"We really played defense tonight," Zogata said. "We tried to get our hands on everything."
But let's not forget about the A&M offense.

Spence (8 kills; .500 hitting per-

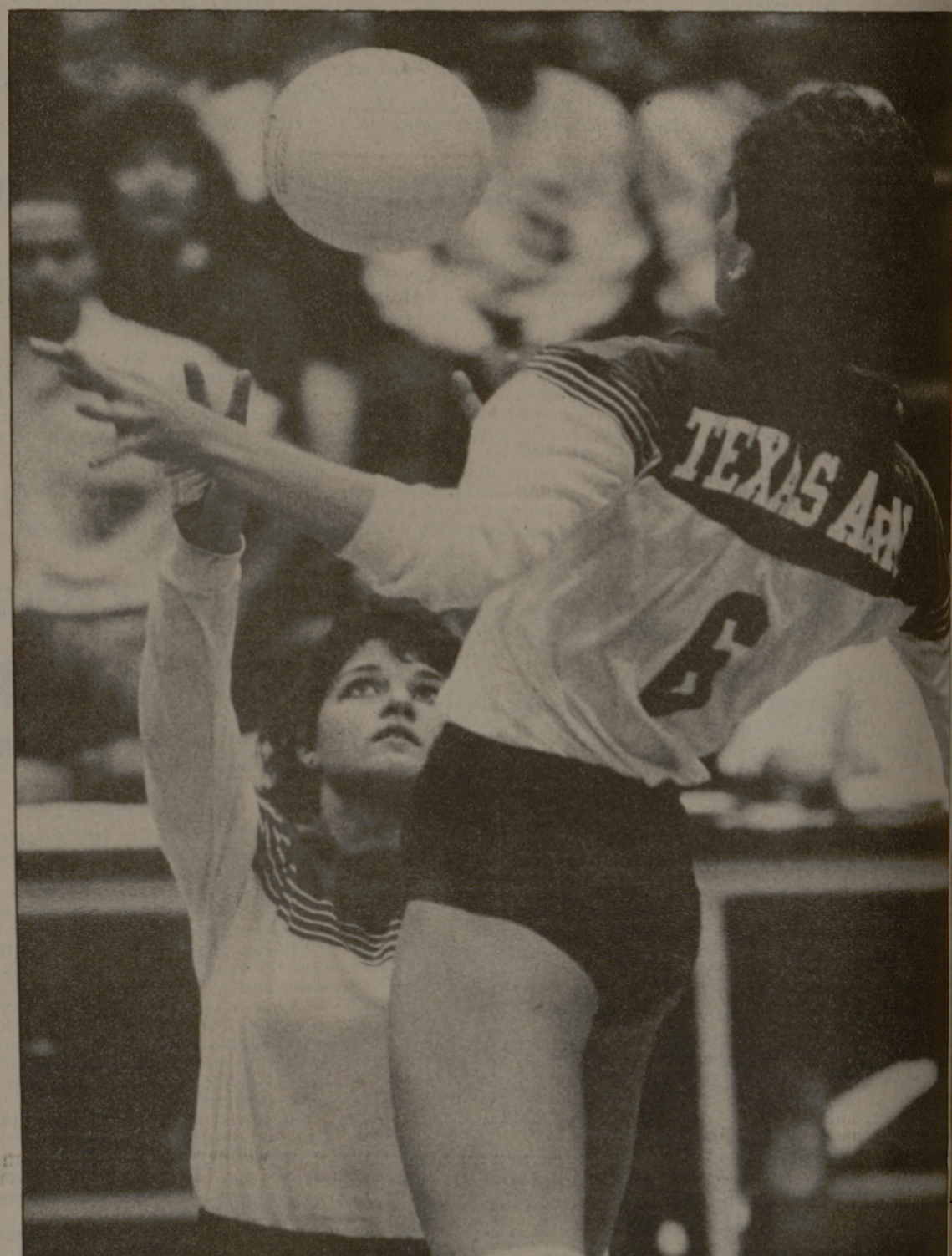

centage), Michelle Whitwell (6, .454) and Stacey Gildner (7, .500) were in charge of the heavy artillery up front.
"Stacey Gildner played extremely well," Condon said. "The setting was better than it's been in awhile. Chris played well. Sherri blocked a lot of balls which is really nice to see."
And the blocking, led by Brinkman, will be the key against the Horns.
"Texas is strong at hitting the corners," Condon said. "We will be trying to block those outside hits to take that away. We were forming a good wall, even when we didn't block well."
"We just need to play against Texas — we have to play very well. If we play good defense, we'll win."

ESPN to air A&M-SMU on national telecast

ESPN decided Saturday night to televise the Texas A&M-SMU game nationally and moved the kickoff time from noon to 6:45 p.m. at the Field.
Raycom Sports, who was originally scheduled to carry the game as part of its Southwest Conference package, has now moved the kickoff of the Texas Tech-Texas game from 1 p.m. to 12:04 p.m. to take the place of A&M-SMU.
The Entertainment and Sports Programming Network announced that the A&M-SMU pregame show will air at 6:30 p.m.
It will be A&M's second appearance on ESPN, since the network picked up its season-opener against Alabama in September.

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
