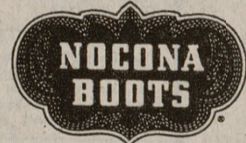

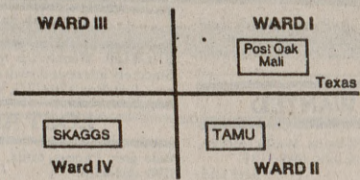

Warped

Man shoots ex-wife, then kills himself

SAN ANTONIO — A 53-year-old San Antonio man gunned down his ex-wife near a middle school playground Monday and then turned the weapon on himself, police said.

John Diaz died in surgery less than an hour after the 8:15 a.m. shooting at Mark Twain Middle School, a spokeswoman at Medical Center Hospital said.

His ex-wife — Dahlia Rivas, 47, a sixth-grade science teacher — was in critical condition with multiple gunshot wounds to the head and stomach, authorities said.

Apparently there were no student witnesses to the shooting in the school's parking lot, said Mary Martha Arana, San Antonio Independent School District spokeswoman.

Rivas, who had taught at the school for 11 years, had just driven into the parking lot and gotten out of her car when she was met by her ex-husband, Arana said.

They became involved in an argument and shots were fired, she said. Some students inside the building heard the gunfire and reported it to school officials, she said.

Computers Artificial-intelligence teleconference set

Texas Instruments Inc. and Texas A&M's computer science department are inviting the public to participate Wednesday in what may be the largest teleconference ever held, when more than 20,000 participants nationwide tune in to a day-long symposium on artificial intelligence.

Presenters include Dr. Edward A. Feigenbaum, professor of computer science at Stanford University; Dr. Randall Davis, associate professor at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology's Sloan School of Management; Dr. Bruce G. Buchanan, professor of computer science research at Stanford; and Dr. Mark S. Fox, assistant professor of industrial automation at Carnegie-Mellon University.

Dr. Harry Tennant, senior member of the technical staff at Texas In-

struments, will moderate panel discussions following the presentation. Tennant invented the concept of menu-based natural language systems, which enable computer operators to communicate with their machines using plain English sentences. Texas Instruments has provided satellite downlinks for the conference at 28 universities and 24 other sites, most of the hotels in major metropolitan areas.

The teleconference will be presented in Rudder Theater from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Wednesday and is free to participants.

Magician debunks psychic powers

DALLAS — Danny Korem has made a living for nearly half his 33 years by telling people how easily and willingly they can be deceived.

Traveling the country on a lecture circuit to universities, churches, conventions and seminars, he earns up to \$3,500 per appearance.

His specialty is debunking psychics.

Through sleight of hand and mental trickery, Korem says he can duplicate so-called "powers."

Chances are the so-called psychic is nothing more than he is: an exceptional magician, Korem says.

"I am not a skeptic. I am a discernor. In other words, if there are real powers out there, fine . . . If I find something 10 years down the road, I'll change my statement that

there is no such thing as human psychic power," he said.

He's offering \$5,000 to anyone who proves him wrong.

Korem — in Dallas this week for a two-part seminar, "Fraud and the Supernatural" — has challenged this Texas city's psychics to subject themselves to his scrutiny, and anyone who passes wins the jackpot.

John Catchings, chairman of the board of the North Texas Parapsychology Association and a psychic of national repute, says Korem probably won't find any takers.

Psychics trust Korem about as much as he trusts them, Catchings said.

"Danny's an excellent magician," Catchings said. But he also called Korem "an individual out promoting what he does. . . . He does a very good demonstration. But it's not about what we do."

According to Catchings, psychic ability "is a God-given natural talent. And it's something everybody has. Some just have more than others."

But Korem says psychic ability is a consciously developed skill in manipulating human judgment.

"I can take anybody, almost anybody, and convince him that I have a power," Korem said. "Sixty percent of any audience that I'm in front of will be convinced that I have power."

Korem said his ability to understand deception stems from the tricks he invented as a professional magician and an understanding of human behavior.

But Catchings counters that psychics have true powers, and points to the 18-point code of ethics of the North Texas Parapsychology Association which prohibits the use of "magic, sleight of hand or other trickery."

Wife claims mob killed husband over loan

HOUSTON — Authorities Monday were trying to identify a badly charred body they found in a Harris County businessman's burned car that was abandoned in a field.

But the wife of the car's owner says she believes that the body is her husband's, and that organized crime figures from Miami killed him for failing to repay a \$250,000 loan.

The body, burned beyond recognition, was found Friday in a sports car owned by Edward Gerald Baker, 52, chairman of oil investment and

securities firm Vanguard Groups International Inc. of Houston.

The Harris County Medical Examiner's office had not identified the body Monday, but Baker's wife, Sandy Baker, said she believes the body is her husband's because his ring was found in the car.

Baker was discovered missing about 9:15 a.m. Thursday when his gardener discovered that the businessman's home had been burglarized, authorities said.

Mrs. Baker said her husband told her on the telephone about 3 a.m.

Thursday that Florida-based organized crime figures were angry with him because he failed to repay a \$250,000 loan.

"He knew they were going to kill him," said Mrs. Baker, 49, who married Edward Baker six months ago. "He told me they were going to kill him."

Baker told his wife that he might die, and that if he did to be strong. "He said, 'You'll hurt at first, but you'll be OK,'" Mrs. Baker recalled.

She said Baker had sent her to her daughter's Austin home Tuesday because he feared she was in danger.

Mrs. Baker said she and her husband went to Miami about six weeks ago to "pacify" the people who loaned Baker the \$250,000.

The Bakers tried unsuccessfully to arrange another way to repay the loan, she said.

"I didn't understand all of the business," she said. "He tried to keep me out of the business. He didn't want me to know anything. He said I was safer that way."
