Students decide

against paying college athletes

A group of about 250 students faced each other in an open forum debate Monday on whether or not to pay college athletes like profession-

There were hands waved and voices raised in protest. And despite good arguments on both sides, the majority dècided against paying col-lege athletes on scholarship. A body count as students left after the de-bate showed a score of 83 in favor

and 153 against the resolution.

The Texas A&M Debate Society sponsor of the debate.

Brett Shine, a former student body president candidate, argued against the resolution. Kyle Barrington, a junior speech communications major, argued in favor of the resolu-

Barrington began the opening remarks and said that without some kind of payment system, college athletics might crumble. He cited a study that said almost 60 percent of the college athletic programs are in danger of collapsing. Barrington also said colleges know that student athletes are an as-set sold to the public for power and influence. And that a school's teams

are great public relations pawns.

He said universities in the United States have become dependent upon college football for millions of dollars, and yet the players receive no compensation.

Shine said in his opening remarks that the goal of college athletics has been clouded by recruiting scandals. He said he preferred the status quo to the proposal that college players

be payed.

He added that college scholarships can be worth as much as \$150,000.

Shine said the resolution defeats the original intention of scholarships
— providing an education. He said emphasis in college athletics should be to put the student back in the student athlete.


