Student Senate passes bill encouraging walking bikes

The Student Senate Wednesday night passed the bicycle bill, which recommends that students walk, rather than ride, their bicycles through a designated section of campus.

The region included in the bill begins at Military Walk and extends to Spence Street. It encompasses the areas surrounding the Academic Building, the Sterling C. Evans Library and the Agriculture Building.

Sen. Billy McCaskill, co-sponsor of the bill, told the Senate the University's Ground Maintenance Department has indicated its willingness to finance implementation of the bill. The bill calls for the placement of signs around the perimeter of the specified region encouraging students to walk their bicycles.

He said that although University Police lack the manpower to enforce such a bill, they might be able to have an officer occasionally observe the area.

"Mr. Wiatt (Bob Wiatt, Director of Security and Traffic) did say in a later conversation that it would be possible to have one officer out at periodic times going through this area — not really patrolling it but just seeing if it was actually going into effect and if the majority of the students are in actuality walking their bicycles through this area," McCaskill said.

McCaskill also presented the Senate with a map of a Grounds Maintenance proposal which called for a larger area to be covered than that specified in the Senate bill.

He said if the "No Bicycles" effort proves successful in the region covered in the bill, the policy possibly could eventually be extended to

cover the rest of the area proposed by Grounds Maintenance.

The bill next goes to the office of Dr. John Koldus, the school's vice president for student services, from which it will be channeled to Grounds Maintenance, McCaskill said.

Sen. Tom Black objected to the bill.

"I don't think it's going to do any good," Black said. "It's dealing with people who are in a hurry and if I'm in a hurry I'm going to try to get there regardless."

However, Sen. Eva McGee said rejection of the bill based on speculation that it wouldn't work would be a mistake.

"I think we have to give it a chance and we have to say, 'Students, are you willing to do what you can to make this a safer campus for pedestrians?'" McGee said.

Texas' teacher of the year to speak today

A&M passes \$100,000 mark in United Way campaign

Texas A&M has raised \$102,000 for the Brazos Valley United Way campaign, United Way Executive Director Robert Fleisher said Wednesday.

The United Way is an organization which raises money to support area community services.

The Texas A&M System and the colleges of engineering and agriculture have raised \$37,675, and the

University has raised \$63,469, Fleisher said.

He said A&M students have raised \$371. But, Fleisher said, other student fund-raising activities have taken place and he expects to see more money coming in soon.

He said the total United Way goal for students, the University and the System is \$114,000 and that the System has raised funds that have not been counted yet.

A&M is targeted to raise 24 per-

cent of the Brazos Valley United Way total budget, which is \$475,000 this year. Fleisher said he is not sure how much money the county has raised because money is still coming.

Fleisher said he's not sure if this goal will be met because the employees at the local Texas Instrument plant have been a major United Way contributors, and the plant recently announced its closing.

Fleisher said the Texas Instruments employees usually contribute

\$15,000 to the United Way contribution.

He said United Way does have a contingency fund to draw from, if a small amount of money is needed to achieve the \$475,000 goal.

If there is a large gap between the funds raised and the United Way goal, Fleisher said, the agencies that United Way supports may not be able to provide as many services as they have in the past.
