GM unsure if call back will be issued

ARLINGTON — General Motors officials said they don't know if 350 workers, who will be laid off indefinitely on Feb. 10, will be called back to work.

Plant manager Paul Townley said Wednesday that GM will cut production by 92 cars per day at its plant here because of lagging car sales.

Layoffs and production cuts are the result of lagging sales of the Chevrolet Monte Carlo and Oldsmobile Cutlass models produced here, said Townley.

"If the market increased for the demand of the car, it could be (temporary)," Townley said.

Last week management informed workers that Arlington has been dropped from consideration to build an advanced front-wheel car called the GM 10.

About 4,500 hourly workers at the plant are represented by United Auto Workers Local 276, according to union local president John Child-ers. He said the union is evaluating the announcement of layoffs and exploring options.

"I certainly don't like it," Childers said. "Anytime we lose jobs, it's not only a loss to the members and their families. It's an economic loss to the

community." GM officials said the plant will continue to operate two shifts and produce 60 cars an hour but they will cut production by instituting mass relief techniques.

Mass relief calls for the complete shutdown of the line four times a day, officials said. Individual relief allows each

workers two 23-minute breaks during an eight-hour shift while the line continues to move.

Roger Bohn, general supervisor of personnel, said, "We can reduce our production this way without re-shuffling all the jobs."

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
