# Texas sets economic example

DALLAS — U.S. Sen. Gary Hart, criticizing the Reagan administration's fiscal policy, said Monday the nation could learn a valuable lesson from the Texas economy's attempt to recover from ailing energy and electronics industries.

"We are here to examine one of the country's most intriguing examples of rebounding from energy problems," Hart said. "This state's creativity has lessons for the entire country."

Hart, a Colorado Democrat, spoke to about 170 people at an economic symposium attended by former Labor Secretary Ray Marshall. The symposium featured business leaders from some of Texas' newest industries, including optoelectronics, biotechnology and space industrialization.

"The challenges being faced in Texas are being faced by others," Hart said. "Texas' success (in diversification) can set a model for Pittsburgh with its steel industry, Detroit with the automotive plants and the farm economy of Iowa," Hart said.

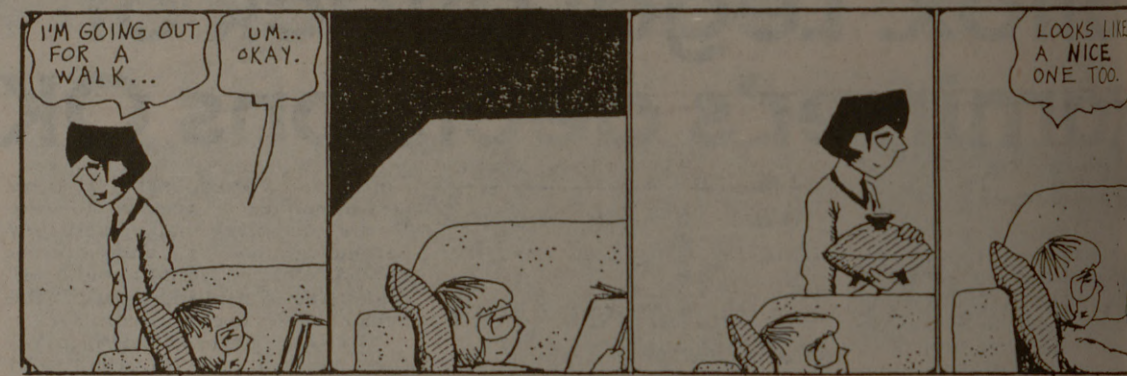
Hart, a Democratic presidential candidate in 1984, told a news conference after the three-hour symposium that the Reagan administration has hurt economic revitalization.

"We can't have a president in office saying the government is our enemy," Hart told reporters. "No other nation on the earth thinks this way."

"This is happening while an administration is spending millions of dollars on the nation's defense and yet will not spend money to fight the trade imbalance," Hart said.

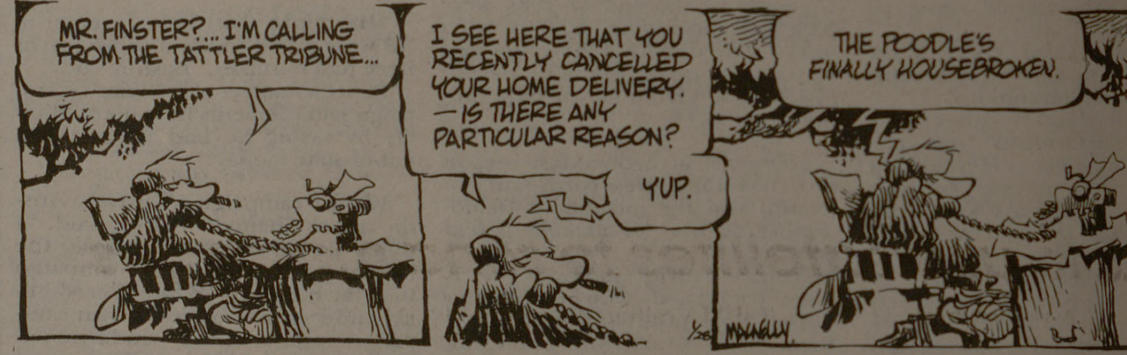

# Head of beef producers promoting solidarity

SAN ANTONIO — Beef is still No. 1 on America's dinner tables, and unity among the nation's producers will keep it that way, the president of the National Cattlemen's Association said Monday.

Jo Ann Smith of Micanopy, Fla., told the 5,000 people attending the organization's annual meeting that a new \$1-per-head, check-off program should go a long way toward promoting beef consumption.

The estimated \$60 to \$70 million earned by the check-off will be used to develop promotion and research programs, Smith said.

The check-off program, enacted in the 1985 Farm Bill, will involve payment of \$1 each time a head of cattle changes hands.

The money will be pooled for research on new beef products that will be palatable to consumers. The funds also will go for information and educational programs and promotion efforts.

Currently 38 states have individual check-off programs generating an estimated \$18 million.


"The new program is not perfect," Smith said. "It won't guarantee a profit for everyone. But right now it's the only game in town."

Many cattlemen have been forced out of business by "devastating financial circumstances," she said.

"Beef still is eaten regularly in 90 percent of American homes...," she said.

# A&M political science ranks 2nd in U.S. for publications

The Texas A&M political science department recently moved from third to second in national ranking based on the number and quality of publications in six major field journals.

Dr. Bryan Jones, head of the political science department, said the number of articles published in field journals is the primary method of ranking departments.

This ranking will probably affect the recruitment of new faculty most, Jones said, but perhaps students will see the ranking as proof of a top-notch department.

He added that the ranking will be helpful to students going to law or graduate school because department recommendations will carry more weight.

Norman Luttbeg, a political science professor, said the department wants to add a doctoral program, and this sort of recognition certainly helps.

Jones said he is not sure if the improved ranking will mean more money for his department.

But, he said, it helps if those above him know that the department has a quality program.

The high ranking, Jones said, not only reflects how far the political science department has come but how much progress the entire College of Liberal Arts has made.

This rating, he said, shows that the College of Liberal Arts is doing as well in research as the other colleges.

The publications involved in the study included The Western Political Quarterly, American Political Sci-

ence Review, American Journal of Political Science, Journal of Polity and the Social Science Quarterly.

Luttbeg said there are other factors to evaluate a department, but number of articles published in primary journals is an indication of search activity.

Southern Illinois University conducted a study of research in 1982. A count of articles was for the period of 1978-1981 which the University of Missouri was ranked No. 1, with University of Kentucky and A&M following second and third positions respectively.

But the study, which was conducted by A&M in Fall 1985, ranked second with 15 articles for the period of 1983-84. The University of Kentucky received the No. 1 ranking.
