### A&M to begin second half against last-place Baylor

Halfway through the tough Southwest Conference basketball season, Texas A&M has already surpassed much of what it wanted to ac-

• A&M is undefeated at home this season, having won all nine con-tests played in front of rowdy G. Rollie White Coliseum crowds.

Wednesday night, A&M domi-nated hapless Arkansas 81-67 to end an 11-game losing skid against the Hogs from the Ozarks.
