DALLAS — Houston beat Texas A&M, 80-73, in Wednesday's first round of the fourth annual Southwest Conference Women's Post-Season Classic at Moody Coliseum.

A&M now has lost each of its four first-round SWC tournament games. The Lady Aggies lost to Houston in the opening round of last year's tournament, 84-72.

A&M finishes the season with a 16-13 overall record.

The Lady Aggies had split with the Lady Cougars during the regu-

lar season, losing 80-75 in Hofheinz Pavilion and winning 71-70 in G. Rollie White Coliseum.

Sonya Watkins, Houston's 6-1 senior center, set a tournament record with 37 points in the A&M game. Watkins finished the regular season as the conference's leading scorer, averaging 20.7 points per game. She also led the Cougars in rebounding

with 8 a game.
