Letter claims Marcos tried to buy U.S. officials' support

MANILA, Philippines — Top generals pledged loyalty Wednesday to new President Corazon Aquino, and a Cabinet official left for Washington in an attempt to recover millions of dollars allegedly hidden by ousted President Ferdinand E. Marcos.

Jovito Salonga, head of the Commission on Good Government, said before leaving for the United States that he would consider investigating a claim Marcos had schemed to influence Washington with huge campaign contributions.

Salonga said he had received a letter, purportedly from a group of Filipino bankers, saying Marcos planned to donate \$57 million to President Reagan's 1980 and 1984

election campaigns and \$10 million to other U.S. candidates.

The letter provided no documentation to support the claim, and there was no independent verification. It also did not say any money actually was paid or that any U.S. official agreed to accept it.

Salonga said he received the letter Saturday from former banker Antonio Gatmaitan, who said it was written by 14 Filipino bankers whom he refused to identify.

In Washington, White House spokesman Larry Speakes said he was unaware of any such influence-buying scheme by Marcos.

Aquino met for more than an hour with 61 top generals and regional military commanders at

Camp Aguinaldo, where the revolution began that put her in power Feb. 25.

Chief of Staff Gen. Fidel V. Ramos, who was Marcos' deputy military commander before he defected to support Aquino, said all the officers pledged their support and loyalty to the commander-in-chief.

Earlier Wednesday, Aquino met with her full Cabinet.

The ministers put off a decision on whether to declare a revolutionary government, assigning the matter to a committee.

Such a proclamation would free Aquino to dismiss the National Assembly and make changes in the autocratic administrative system left by Marcos.

Spaniards vote to keep Spain in NATO

MADRID, Spain — Spaniards voted Wednesday to keep their country in NATO in a victory for the pro-European policies of Socialist Prime Minister Felipe Gonzalez, official poll returns showed.

Partial returns showed 38.4 percent of the voters favored the government's decision to stay in NATO in the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, Minister Jose Barrionuevo reported.

Barrionuevo said that 38.4 percent of the 38.6 million registered voters voted in favor of staying in NATO, while 38.6 percent of the 38.6 million registered voters voted to leave.

He said the projections showed 58 percent of the 38.6 million registered voters voted to stay.

As recently as last week, opinion polls indicated that 58 percent of voters would reject NATO membership by a margin of 4 to 7 percent.

Such a move would have made Spain the first nation in its 37-year history to withdraw completely from membership.

France ended the integration of its military forces with NATO in 1966 but remained a member.

South Africans condemn shooting, ban

JOHANNESBURG — Prominent whites joined anti-apartheid groups Wednesday in angry response to a report that police fired into a black crowd without provocation the day before, and to banning orders against two black leaders.

Police said the crowd of 2,000 people gathered Tuesday outside a small courtroom in which black youths were facing riot charges, refused to disperse and got out of control.

Police spokesman Capt. Henry Beck said, "When you have a situation where a courtroom can accommodate only 30 people and thousands are milling around, then the situation can very easily get out of control."

Tear gas and then birdshot was fired at the crowd in Kabokweni township, police said.

An official statement said a youth, 14, was shot dead and 80 people were wounded.

"A culture of (black) resistance is being born before our eyes," said Frederick van Zyl Slabbert, a white politician. "I say there cannot be any peaceful change in South Africa. We are caught up in violence."

Enos Mabuza, chief minister of the KaNgwane homeland, demanded a full investigation of the shooting.

The Progressive Federal Party, the main political opposition, said it had begun its own investigation.

The white establishment in the south coast city of Port Elizabeth denounced the banning Tuesday of two of the area's black leaders, Mkhuleni Jack and Henry Fazzie. The 5-year ban prohibits them from speaking publicly, publishing writings or being quoted in the media.

Twisters rip through South, kill two in Alabama

Waves of thunderstorms with damaging winds, tornadoes and large hail swept from Texas into Alabama Wednesday, killing two people, tossing trucks and derailing a freight train in the second barrage of deadly storms this week.

Scores of people remained homeless after twisters and high winds

scoured Ohio, Indiana and Kentucky Monday, killing six people, injuring more than 100 and causing nearly \$30 million damage.

In Wednesday's storms, two people were killed when a tornado struck rural homes near Carrollton, Ala., Pickens County officials said. The State Emergency Management Agency said tornadoes touched down in several other areas.

"It hit several homes," said Virginia Kennedy of the Pickens County Sheriff's Office.

"We have a row of houses that was blown down, we have a row of mobile homes that was blown over," he said.

LeAnne Davidson of the State Office of Emergency Services said a train stopped near Fair Oaks, Ark., because of heavy hail.
