Astro late rally nips Braves, 3-2

ATLANTA (AP) — Craig Reynolds said he didn't anticipate getting in the game the way Atlanta left-hander Zane Smith was handcuffing the Houston Astros on Wednesday.

But, when Reynolds did get the call, he delivered a two-run pinch-hit single to cap a three-run rally after two outs in the ninth as the Astros edged the Braves 3-2.

"I didn't hit it that well, I just hit it in the right spot," Reynolds said after lifting **National** his season RBI total to nine, including eight against Atlanta.

Smith, 1-1, had cuffed Houston on four hits going into the ninth and was within one strike of hurling his second consecutive shutout when he threw four balls in succession on an 0-2 count to Kevin Bass.

John Denny, 1-1, was tagged for five runs in 3 1/2 innings.

Reynolds said he decided to go for the first pitch if it was in the strike zone.

"It just happened to be up the

middle," Reynolds said. "It was down, a pretty good pitch. It was a split finger fastball."

"I got Reynolds to do what I wanted him to do," Sutter said of the grounder. "I can't guide 'em. I feel bad for Zane. He pitched a heckuva ball game."

The victory went to Julio Solano, 1-0, who worked a scoreless eighth inning in relief and Dave Smith pitched the final inning to gain his sixth save.

Atlanta scored twice in the fourth when Dale Murphy opened with a walk and moved to second on Bob Horner's single to left.

Terry Harper advanced both runners with a sacrifice bunt and Glenn Hubbard drove in Murphy with a sacrifice fly to left.

After Bruce Benedict was walked intentionally following an 0-2 count, Andres Thomas hit an RBI double down the left-field line.

Houston starter Bob Knepper, allowed six hits, walked four and struck out three over seven innings.

Zane Smith struck out nine batters for a career high and walked only one batter.

Padres 7, Reds 4
CINCINNATI (AP) — Andy Hawkins pitched 6 1/2 strong innings and singled twice Wednesday as the San Diego Padres overcame a grand-slam homer by Cincinnati's Dave Parker to beat the Reds 7-4.

Hawkins, 1-2, allowed just four

hits as San Diego broke a four-game losing streak and handed the Reds their fourth straight loss. He struck out six and walked two.

It was Parker's fifth homer of the season and drew an ovation from the crowd of 11,937. Parker was playing his first game since being sued by the Pittsburgh Pirates, who are trying to stop his deferred salary payments on grounds his performance in Pittsburgh was diminished by admitted cocaine use.

Phillies 5, Expos 4
MONTREAL (AP) — Steve Carlton won his first game since last May 20 and Steve Jeltz hit a three-run triple as the Philadelphia Phillies ended a five-game losing streak with a 5-4 win over the Montreal Expos on Wednesday.

The 41-year-old Carlton, who was just 1-8 last year and spent most of the year on the disabled list with a strained rotator cuff, worked 5 1/2 innings, allowing three runs on five hits, striking out six and walking six. It was the 315th victory of his career and the first in three decisions this year.

Don Carman and Steve Bedrosian finished, with Bedrosian picking up his first save. The loser was Joe Hesketh, 0-3.

Cubs 6, Cardinals 0
CHICAGO (AP) — Scott Sanderson pitched a five-hitter Wednesday and Ryne Sandberg paced a 12-hit Chicago attack with a pair of doubles and a run-scoring single as the Cubs shut out the St. Louis Cardinals 6-0.

Sanderson, 1-1, struck out seven and walked one. He was perfect through four innings before yielding a leadoff single to Jack Clark in the fifth.

The Cubs, meanwhile, nipped loser Rick Ownbey, 1-1, for single runs in the first and the fourth. They chased Ownbey after yielding a single in the fifth inning, and eight single runs in the sixth and eighth.

Dodgers 6, Giants 4
SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Mike Marshall and Bill Madlock each homered and Fernando Valenzuela contributed with both his arm and his bat as the Los Angeles Dodgers beat the San Francisco Giants 6-4 Wednesday and snapped the Giants' six-game winning streak.

Both Marshall and Madlock had three hits and Marshall drove in four runs for the Dodgers. Valenzuela, 2-1, went all the way, allowing eight hits, striking out 10 and walking three. He also singled home a run in the sixth.

Giants starter Scott Garrelts, 2-2, took the loss.

Rangers 'share wealth,' jab Jays, 9-8

TORONTO (AP) — The Texas Rangers are not a team accustomed to prosperity, but right now they are sharing the wealth.

"It's not just one or two guys, it's everybody in the lineup who's swinging the bat real well," said designated hitter Larry Parrish, who went 4-for-4 with a homer and five runs batted in Wednesday to lead the Rangers to a 9-8 victory over the **American** Toronto Blue Jays. "The other pitchers can't pitch around one guy because the next guy is just as capable."

George Wright, hitting ahead of Parrish in the order, went 4-for-5 with two RBI and three runs scored.

"We've got guys who can put the ball over the fence," said Wright, filling in for left fielder Gary Ward, who was excused from the game to return home where his daughter was undergoing surgery. "I know what my role is with the team and all I can do is go out and give it 110 percent whenever I'm in there."

The victory gave Texas a record of 8-6 and dropped the defending AL East champion Blue Jays to 6-9.

Toronto, trailing 9-5 in the ninth, pulled to within a run when Lloyd Moseby walked, Tony Fernandez singled and George Bell hit his third homer of the year.

Mitch Williams, 1-0, pitched 2/3 of an inning for the victory.

The Rangers broke open a 5-5 tie with four runs in the seventh against reliever Dennis Lamp, 0-2. After Pete Incaviglia reached on a fielder's choice and Wright singled, Parrish delivered a two-run double to left and Don Slaught followed with a

two-run homer to left, his third of the year.

Bell hit a three-run homer in the bottom of the ninth for Toronto but the rally against reliever Greg Harris fell short.

Rookie Kelly Gruber's one-out homer off Texas starter Mike Mason in the sixth had tied the game for Toronto after homers by Wright and Parrish put Texas ahead in the top half of the inning.

Wright opened the sixth against Dave Stieb with his first homer of the season, pulling the Rangers into a 4-4 tie. Parrish followed with his third homer to put Texas ahead and chase Stieb. The Toronto ace, still looking for his first victory of the year, allowed five runs on nine hits.

The Blue Jays had gone ahead 4-3 in the third against Mason when Bell singled to right leading off, moved to third on Jesse Barfield's double and scored on Willie Upshaw's sacrifice fly.

Toronto fell behind 3-0 in the first, but came back in the next inning with three runs on four hits. After a leadoff walk to Upshaw and successive singles by Cliff Johnson and Gruber loaded the bases, Garth Iorg hit a run-scoring single to center and Jeff Hearn followed with a two-run single up the middle.

The Rangers took a 3-0 lead in the first on consecutive two-out singles by Pete O'Brien and Incaviglia, a run-producing single by Wright, a wild pitch and a two-run single by Parrish.

Mariners 4, Twins 3 (10)
SEATTLE (AP) — Dave Henderson's two-run homer in the bottom of the 10th inning lifted Seattle to a

4-3 victory over the Minnesota Twins on Wednesday, snapping a six-game Mariners' losing streak.

The Twins had taken a 3-2 lead on Kent Hrbek's RBI single in the top of the 10th.

Reliever Mark Portugal, 0-1, walked Danny Tartabull to lead off for the Mariners' 10th. After Jim Presley bunted to move Tartabull to second, Henderson fell behind 0-2, but then lined his second homer of the year over the right-field wall.

White Sox 2, Brewers 1
MILWAUKEE (AP) — Pinch-hitter Reid Nichols hit a double down the right-field line in the ninth inning to score Bobby Bonilla with the winning run as the Chicago White Sox defeated the Milwaukee Brewers 2-1 Wednesday night.

With one out, Milwaukee reliever Dan Plesac, 1-1, walked Bonilla and then yielded a single to Tim Lulett to set up Nichols' double. Nichols was pinch hitting for shortstop Chico Guillen.

Tom Seaver, 2-2, pitched six-hit ball over 8 1/2 while striking out seven and walking three. Bob James got the final out for his second save.

Indians 5, Orioles 1
CLEVELAND (AP) — Brook Jacoby, Julio Franco and Carmen Castillo homered and Ken Schrom combined with Scott Bailes on a six-hitter Wednesday night to give the Cleveland Indians a 5-1 victory over the Baltimore Orioles.

Schrom, 3-1, allowed three hits, struck out one and walked two in six innings. The right-hander did not allow a runner past first base until

the sixth inning. Bailes, a rookie left-hander, pitched three scoreless innings for his second save.

Three of the Indians' first four hits off Baltimore starter Scott McGregor, 1-2, were home runs. He lasted just 3 1/2 innings, yielding four runs on five hits.

Tigers 3, Red Sox 1
BOSTON (AP) — Dave Collman and Darnell Coles keyed a decisive two-run fifth with RBI singles and Frank Tanana overcame wildness with a three-hitter over eight innings as the Detroit Tigers defeated the Boston Red Sox 3-1 on Wednesday night.

Tanana, 2-1, walked six and struck out one in numbing 40-degree weather, but was tough in the clutch as the Tigers took the rubber of a three-game series. Willie Hernandez pitched the ninth for his fifth save.

Yankees 2, Royals 1
KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Ken Griffey collected three hits in support of Dennis Rasmussen's three hit pitching over seven innings Wednesday night, sparking New York to a 2-1 victory over Kansas City and the Royals' first three game sweep in Royals Stadium since 1974.

ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP) — California right-hander Mike Witt pitched a five-hitter and a fielding error by Oakland left fielder Jose Canseco led to three unearned runs as the Angels defeated the A's 5-0 Wednesday night.

TCU reportedly to discuss penalties with NCAA

FORT WORTH (AP) — Texas Christian University officials will meet with the NCAA Committee on Infractions to discuss possible penalties, according to published reports.

The school's football program has been under investigation since September when Coach Jim Wacker dismissed seven football players for accepting money from boosters.

The school faces such possible penalties as loss of scholarships and

sanctions against television and bowl game appearances, the Fort Worth Star-Telegram said Wednesday, citing an unidentified source close to the investigation.

TCU officials are scheduled to meet with the committee on infractions this weekend in Scottsdale, Ariz.

The Dallas Morning News, also quoting an unnamed source, reported TCU officials will seek clarification of the sanctions at the meeting.

Officials received the committee's proposed sanctions about a month ago and are expected to appear before the committee and stress the school's self-disclosure of the violations, the News reported.

TCU Athletic Director Frank Windeger refused comment on the meeting to the Associated Press on Wednesday. Windeger said terms

of the investigation forbid school officials from talking about the matter.

After notification of committee findings, TCU would have 15 days to appeal to the 44-member NCAA council.
