and throwing out runners at first. "I'm not disappointed with the way I've played," Cooper said. "My statistics are right at, or a little above, last year's. But the main thing I've concentrated on is trying to lead the team. In the past, if I didn't bat over 300 I would be mad. But now, I'm concentrating more on getting everyone fired up and ready to play. I try to be an example and leader.

"I think I'm playing a lot better the past few weeks. At the first of the season, I was pressing too hard trying to be the one the team could count on all the time."

And Cooper said not having someone to depend on all the time is what has made this year's No. 4ranked Aggies, 33-8, so tough.

"I couldn't compare this team to any of the other three I've been on," Cooper said. "We really care about each other and get along really well. We all know that in order for it to


In '83, Cooper's freshman season, she was an integral part of the Aggies' national championship team.
