

Republican gubernatorial candidate Kent Hance said Tuesday he has traditionally been a fast finisher in campaigns and is confident his late-hitting campaign strategy will pay off in the GOP primary Satur-

Hance, 43, a former Democratic congressman from Lubbock, spoke at a brief news conference at Easterwood Airport that was attended by about 40 supporters. He is opposed by former Gov. Bill

Clements of Dallas and Rep. Tom Loeffler of Hunt.

"We save our money and hit hard late in the campaign," Hance said. "A lot of voters don't make a deci-sion until the last 10 days and that's the most important time.

When asked about Loeffler's contention that Loeffler is the only GOP candidate who's never lost an election, Hance said, "He's right, but he's only run in San Angelo and Mesa and San Antonio.

And I think one of the problems he faces is they still don't know how to pronounce his name in Dallas or Houston. That's nothing against him, but he's never run a statewide


