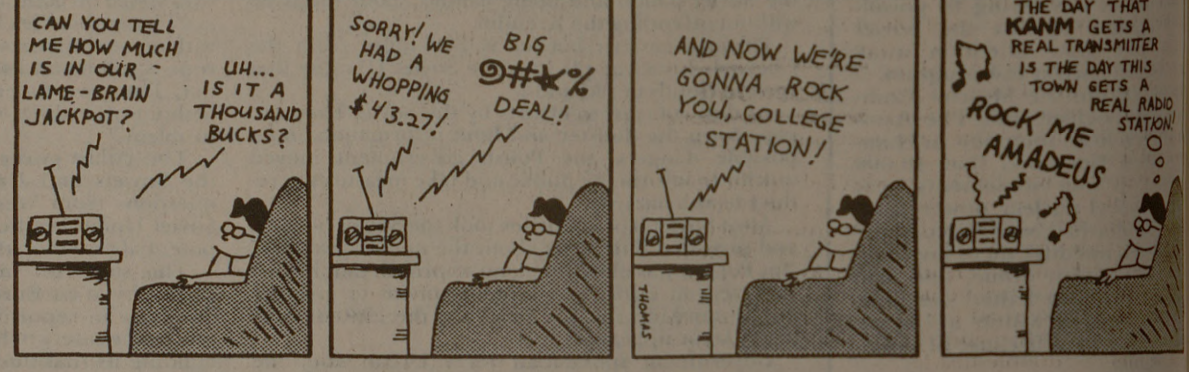

'Joe Bob' leaves drive-in; creator takes act to public

DALLAS (AP) — For three years, he was a drawing, offending voice from behind closed doors, nothing but a dotted outline of a redneck bumpkin in newspapers' promotional ads.

But now, almost exactly a year after the Dallas Times Herald yanked the "Joe Bob Goes To The Drive-In" column for being too offensive, Joe Bob Briggs has gone public.

On college campuses, in comedy clubs and with videocassettes, he is trying to show America "that Joe Bob ain't Darth Vader."

Former Times Herald columnist John Bloom, who began writing the Joe Bob columns in January 1982, says he had to dump Joe Bob's celebrated anonymity to keep his alter ego alive.

He contends his former bosses — the guys who Joe Bob entertains Jesus in one of his comedy routines to turn into "editor fondue" — have tried to assassinate Joe Bob to keep him quiet.

Bloom has sued the newspaper and the Los Angeles Times Syndicate, which had distributed the column to 57 newspapers nationally, over rights to the Joe Bob name.

He is seeking \$900,000 in damages and charges that the Times Herald indefinitely delayed publication of a book of "Joe Bob Goes To The Drive-In" columns in a dispute over who owns rights to the fictitious persona.

The newspaper dropped the Joe Bob column last April after Bloom's

parody of the pop music song "Are The World" precipitated a storm of protest from the city's black community.

Times Herald Associate Editor Roy Bode says the paper has not attempted to censor Bloom but has tried to set some conditions on the use of the character. Specifically, the Times Herald didn't want Joe Bob to attack the paper either in his columns or in speeches. Bloom said that censorship and has refused to bend.

So while attorneys from both sides try to work out a settlement, Bloom, who is working on an historical novel, actively is promoting his alter ego through stand-up comedy routines, videos and speeches around the country.

Female Vietnam vets seek memorial statue

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — She stands sad-eyed and tired, a stethoscope around her neck and a helmet in her hands. To Diane Carlson Evans and other women who served in Vietnam, she is a symbol of something too long forgotten.

Evans hopes to see that woman, a 7-foot statue, standing at the Vietnam memorial in Washington, D.C., to those who fought and died in the war.

Evans, 39, of River Falls, Wis., is one of the founders of the Vietnam Women's Memorial Project, a volunteer group based in Minneapolis that has launched a nationwide drive to raise \$1 million to erect a statue honoring military and civilian women Vietnam veterans.

She says the statue would balance a statue of three male veterans overlooking the Vietnam Veterans Memorial, a wall of polished black granite bearing the names of more than 58,000 Americans killed or missing in Southeast Asia.

The Wall bears the names of eight women, though an estimated 10,000 women served in Vietnam. Some 7,000 of them served as military nurses, and the rest as Red Cross workers, air traffic controllers, CIA employees or in other capacities.

The statue was born in 1983, when Evans, attending a salute to Vietnam veterans, saw the work of Minneapolis sculptor Rodger Brodin, known for his statues of soldiers.

Brodin said, "The message I got from Diane was she was tired (in Vietnam). Tired of the hours, tired of the war, tired of the climate. This statue is tired."

So far, \$60,000 has been raised for the project. The target dedication date is Veterans Day 1987.

DETROIT (AP) — General Motors Corp. has announced the recall of 1983-85 Chevrolet Camaros and Pontiac Firebirds and 1985 Chevrolet Astro and GMC Safari Vans due to possible seat belt and steering column defects.

About 738,000 Camaros and Firebirds are being recalled because their shoulder belts may not retract properly, GM said.

There are 11 alleged injuries in seven accidents which may have involved the seat belts, GM spokesman David Hudgens said.

About 26,700 Astro and Safari vans are being recalled because there is a chance that a part of the power steering gear housing could break, GM said.

NEW YORK (AP) — You can split the chocolate wafers and scrape off the sugary filling with your two front teeth; or you can throw caution to the wind and munch them whole. You can dunk 'em in milk or smash 'em in your ice cream.

However it's done, it's done lots: Oreo cookies are the world's top selling cookies — more than 100 billion have been sold since they were introduced 75 years ago,

according to the Guinness Book of World Records.

The cookies are sold in 25 countries, and about \$100 million is spent on Oreos, the company says.

All the Oreo cookies that were ever eaten were piled one on top of the other, they would reach to the moon and back twice; if placed side by side, they'd circle the equator 130 times, Nabisco says.
