No-hitters guide Aggies to victories

MONROE, La. — The Texas A&M softball team pitching duo of Shawn Andaya and Julie Carpenter tossed back-to-back no-hitters Sunday to take a pair from Northeast Louisiana.

The No. 2 Aggies, 36-11, won the opener 4-0 behind Carpenter's seven strikeouts.

A&M second baseman Judy Trussell led the offensive attack, scoring two runs after reaching base on singles.

Carrie Heightly and Erin Newkirk both went 2-for-3 for the Aggies. Carpenter's record moves to 17-4 on the season.

In the second game, Andaya, 19-7, whiffed 11 Indian batters in A&M's 8-0 victory.

A&M's Zina Ochoa went 2-for-3 and scored twice, while Cindy Foster also cracked two hits and scored one run.

Cindy Cooper brought home two more Aggie runs on a pair of sacrifice flies.

Against Louisiana Tech Saturday, the Aggies dropped two games by a 1-0 count.

Andaya took the loss in both, as she was tagged for a home run in the bottom of the 12th inning of the second game in relief of Carpenter.

A&M 'crams' for SWC finals with tests in Austin, Houston

At the onset of dead week, the Texas A&M track team appropriately began preparation for its set of finals to be given at the Southwest Conference Track Championships May 17-18 in Houston.

The Aggies used the Texas Invitational in Austin Saturday and the Houston Invitational Sunday as grade markers for the upcoming conference championships.

In the Texas Invitational, middle distance runner Calvin Gaziano and freshman sprinter Floyd Heard

passed their tests with flying colors. Gaziano placed fourth in the 1,500-meter run turning in a personal-best time of 3 minutes, 44.29 seconds, while Heard took first place in the sprints with a 10.34 in the 100-meter dash and a 20.38 in the 200.

Gaziano must cut almost two seconds off his time if he hopes to meet the NCAA qualifying mark of 3:42.54.

"If the conditions are right, he's got a shot at running a second or two faster," A&M assistant coach Steve Silvey said.

A&M's Ian James also had a stellar performance at UT's Memorial

Stadium as he won the long jump with a leap of 25 feet. Sophomore Craig Calk placed second in the hurdles with a career best 50.40, the third-best time in A&M history.

James had little time to rest as he was one of a small group of Aggie field performers who traveled to the Houston Invitational Sunday.

The Canadian national champion jumped 10 1/4 inches farther than the day before but could only muster a second-place finish at 25-10 1/4.

Desmond Kidd placed fourth, established a personal record in the pole vault as he cleared the bar at 15-10 1/2.

Mavericks edge Lakers to even series

DALLAS (AP) — The upstart Dallas Mavericks evened their NBA Western Conference semifinal playoff series against the defending champion Los Angeles Lakers Sunday and now they are talking about winning it.

"We're in it up to our necks now and it would be a big disappointment if we don't win," said Rolando Blackman after the Mavericks stunned the Lakers 120-118 behind Mank Aguirre's 39 points.

Aguirre said, "We've got a good chance now, but the Lakers are still the Lakers and we won't have the upper hand until it's over."

Aguirre's turnaround jumper from the baseline with 38 seconds remaining proved to be the game-winner for Dallas, and he said, "Nobody can guard me 1-on-1 and that's what the Lakers were doing."

"James Worthy was guarding me and the Lakers thought I was going to kick the ball back out to Derek Harper, but I just kept it instead," Aguirre said. "I've been trying to think aggressively."

The Lakers had a chance to tie the game in the final seconds, but Kareem Abdul-Jabbar's patented sky hook missed at the buzzer.

"I just fumbled the ball in my hands on the last shot," Abdul-Jabbar said. "I just don't know if the Mavericks can play any better."

"Everybody in the building knew Kareem was going to take the shot," Dallas center James Donaldson said. "He was a little further out than he wanted to be, but he couldn't back me into the basket because there wasn't time."

Donaldson added, "We keep showing improvement with every game and I think you'll see bigger and better things in Los Angeles."

The fifth game of the best-of-seven series be-

tween the two teams will be played Tuesday night at the Los Angeles Forum.

"We have a good chance to win the series," Dallas Coach Dick Motta said. "Now our team knows what we have to do to win."

"We want to get the same kind of support and excitement from our fans in Los Angeles as the Mavericks do here," Lakers Coach Pat Riley said. "We just didn't get the job done."

Aguirre, who had 21 points in an explosive first quarter, hit his 15-footer to give Dallas a 120-116 lead, but the Lakers' Byron Scott connected on two free throws with 30 seconds to go to set the stage for last-second dramatics.

The Mavericks let the 24-second clock expire without getting off a shot, and the Lakers got the ball with six seconds left.

Abdul-Jabbar, who set an NBA playoff record by appearing in his 173rd game, missed his patented sky hook from 10 feet away at the buzzer as the Mavericks secured their second straight victory over the Lakers.

Nuggets 114, Rockets 111 (OT)

DENVER (AP) — Alex English scored six points in overtime, and Lafayette Lever and T.R. Dunn hit key free throws down the stretch Sunday, rallying the Denver Nuggets to a 114-111 NBA playoff victory over the Houston Rockets, squaring the series at 2-2.

Game 5 in the best-of-seven series is set for Tuesday night in Houston.

The Nuggets trailed 104-99 with 44 seconds left in regulation, but Denver reserve guard Elston Turner made a three-point basket and then slipped along the baseline for a reverse layup with 11 seconds remaining to send the game into overtime.

Houston — getting solid play in the fourth quarter and in overtime from point guard Robert Reid, who scored 11 of his team's final 11 points — grabbed a four-point lead in the extension on Reid's baseline jumper.

A free throw by Reid with 1:31 left put the Rockets up 111-108, but Houston didn't score again against a sticky Denver defense.

English hit two free throws with 1:19 remaining and Lever added two more with 1:02 left, giving Denver its first lead since early in the third quarter.

Dunn fouled after Reid missed a jumper, made both free throws with six seconds remaining to account for the final margin. Alex Leavell's desperation three-point attempt missed at the buzzer.

English, who scored only two points in the first quarter, finished with 28. Lever had 17, Calvin Natt 16 and Turner 13.

Ralph Sampson, whose 15 third-quarter points had put Houston ahead, had 28 points. Reid got 24 and Akeem Olajuwon, who fouled out with 3:09 left in overtime, added 23.

Hawks 106, Celtics 94

ATLANTA (AP) — Dominique Wilkins scored 37 points, including 10 in a row when Atlanta took control in the third quarter, as the Hawks downed the Boston Celtics 106-94, avoiding elimination in their NBA Eastern Conference semifinal playoff Sunday.

The victory cut Boston's lead in the best-of-seven series to 3-1, with Game 5 scheduled for Boston Tuesday night.

Spud Webb, at 5-foot-7 the shortest player in the NBA, finished the game with 21 points for the Hawks.
