

## Power plays give Flames lead in series

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Doug Risebrough beat St. Louis goaltender Greg Millen with a shorthanded blast from the slot in the second period and Calgary continued its power-play dominance as the Flames beat the Blues 5-3 Tuesday night, giving them a 2-1 lead in the NHL Stanley Cup semifinal series.

The fourth game of the Campbell Conference final will be played here Thursday night.

Coming into the series, Calgary was 0-for-14 on the power play against St. Louis. But the Flames have converted seven of 18 power-play opportunities in the three playoff games for nearly half of their 15 goals.

With defenseman Paul Baxter in the penalty box for holding, Risebrough took a pass from Hakan Loob, who had drawn defenseman Rob Ramage to him on a 2-on-1 break. He fired in a quick shot at 14:40 of the second period to give Calgary a 4-2 advantage.

Blues defenseman Brian Benning scored his first NHL goal on a power-play shot from the point at 12:29 of the third period to make it 4-3.

Colin Patterson completed the scoring with an empty net goal with 59 seconds remaining.

## NCAA considers strengthening drug-testing program penalties

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — If a team in next year's NCAA basketball tournament has one player who tests positive for drugs, it may be kicked out of the competition even if the tournament has already begun, NCAA President Jack Davis said Tuesday.

"This is a very significant thing," Davis said in an interview following a news conference. "We think the institution and the team should bear some responsibility if one of its players is found to be using drugs."

Davis said this new wrinkle in the drug-testing program approved in last January's NCAA convention was adopted by the NCAA Executive Committee at its meetings in Kansas City this week. He emphasized that details are yet to be worked out but that the Executive Committee hopes to put the policy into effect for all men's and women's teams championships.

NCAA schools approved a lengthy drug-testing proposal at their convention in New Orleans, including a

list of performance-enhancing substances to be banned as well as street drugs such as cocaine and marijuana. Davis said considerable work remains in deciding how the tests will be administered and when.

The NCAA sponsors 74 championships in men's and women's sports, but tests will not be conducted in every championship every year. The earliest time the testing could be done would be at the cross-country competition next November. Tests will be made at all football bowl games.

## Celtics down Hawks to wrap up series

(AP) — The Boston Celtics outscored Atlanta 36-6 in the third quarter and Houston whipped Denver 40-20 in the second period en route to posting easy victories at home Tuesday night in the NBA playoffs.

On the West Coast, the Los Angeles Lakers edged Dallas 116-113 in the other Western Conference series. The victory gives the Lakers a 3-2 series lead.

The Celtics' 132-99 triumph eliminated the Hawks from the playoffs and advanced Boston into the Eastern Conference finals against the winner of the Philadelphia-Milwaukee series, which is tied 2-2.

Akeem Olujuwon had 36 points and 19 rebounds and Ralph Sampson added 33 points and 17 rebounds as the Rockets defeated Denver 131-103 for a 3-2 edge in that best-of-seven Western Conference semifinal.

**Celtics 132, Hawks 99**  
Boston scored the last 24 points of the third quarter while holding Atlanta to an NBA postseason record low of six in the period.

With Kevin McHale scoring 10 of his 16 third-quarter points during the 24-0 run, the Celtics outscored the Hawks by 30 in the decisive third quarter and captured the series 4-1.

The previous record for fewest points scored in one quarter of a playoff game was eight by the Los Angeles Lakers on April 9, 1972 in a game with Milwaukee. That also occurred in the third period.

Boston notched its 36th consecutive home victory, extending its single-season league record, and won for the 24th time in its last 27 games.

Larry Bird scored 24 of his game-high 36 points to lift Boston to an 11-point halftime lead. McHale finished the game with 25.

**Rockets 131, Nuggets 103**  
Houston could advance to the Western Conference finals with a victory in Game 6 of the best-of-seven series at Denver Thursday night.

The Rockets' victory extended Denver's Summit losing streak to nine. The Nuggets haven't won a game in Houston since April 11, 1984.

"The best thing for us to do was to go out early and blow them out and that's what we did," Rockets guard Mitchell Wiggins said.

Alex English led Denver with 27 points and Lafayette Lever added 20, including 18 in the third period. Rodney McCray scored 21 points for the Rockets.

Denver hit only seven of 27 shots in the second period while the Rockets made 16 of 25 shots from the field.

**Lakers 116, Mavericks 113**  
Kareem Abdul-Jabbar scored 34 points, including a critical hook shot with nine seconds remaining, as defending NBA champion Los Angeles edged Dallas.

The Lakers, coming off a pair of two-point losses in Dallas over the weekend, pulled away from a 107-107 tie with 2 minutes remaining. Baskets by Micheal Cooper, Abdul-Jabbar and Earvin "Magic" Johnson gave Los Angeles a 113-108 lead with 1:13 remaining.

After Sam Perkins cut the difference to three with 31 seconds left, Abdul-Jabbar sank a 12-foot sky hook to make it 115-110 with nine seconds to go. A three-point basket by Dallas' Brad Davis with three seconds remaining and James Worthy's free throw with a second left provided the final margin.

Johnson added 29 points for the Lakers, and Worthy had 17 of his 19 points in the second half.

## Mets handcuff Astros; Home run lifts Rangers

Gooden overpowers Astros 4-0

NEW YORK (AP) — Dwight Gooden, whose two-run seventh-inning triple broke open a duel between the two hottest pitchers in the National League, tossed a two-hitter Tuesday night to beat Bob Knepper and the Houston Astros 4-0.

Gooden, 5-0, who hasn't lost since Aug. 31, 1985, got the only run he needed in the fifth inning when George Foster hit his first homer of the season. Gooden tripled over the head of right fielder Terry Puhl to finish Knepper after Foster walked and Rafael Santana reached on third baseman Denny Walling's two-base throwing error. Kevin Mitchell singled off reliever Charlie Kerfeld to drive in Gooden.

The Mets, leaders in the NL East, have won four in a row and 15 of their last 16, while the NL West-leading Astros have lost three in a row.

The lone Houston hits were a fifth-inning infield single by Glenn Davis, and a ground ball single by Craig Reynolds in the ninth.

Before Davis' hit, Gooden — who struck out seven and walked two — had retired 12 in a row. He was perfect in every inning except the fifth and the ninth.

The 21-year-old Gooden, last year's NL Cy Young winner with a 24-4 record, pitched his second shut-out of the season in his fourth complete game, lowering his earned run average to 1.06.

The left-hander Knepper, 5-1, gave up five hits, including three doubles, the triple and the homer, as his five-game winning streak ended even though his ERA dropped to 1.70. He struck out five and walked two in 6-1/3 innings.

The game was delayed 52 minutes at the start by rain.

Hough returns to beat Tigers

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Rookie Pete Incaviglia hit a two-run homer and Charlie Hough won his 1986 debut as the Texas Rangers defeated the Detroit Tigers 4-2 Tuesday night.

Hough, activated Monday night, had been on the disabled list since spring training when he broke the little finger on his right hand shaking hands with a friend. Hough struck out four and walked two in 6-1/3 innings. Mickey Mahler and Greg Harris finished up in relief.

Dave LaPoint, 0-1, took the loss.

The Tigers scored first in the fourth inning when Darnell Coles doubled home Lance Parrish from first base. Parrish had singled with one out, and Coles followed one out later with a line shot to the wall in left.

The Tigers made it 2-0 in the sixth when Parrish scored again on a Coles' hit. Parrish reached base on a fielder's choice, moved to third on Harry

Spilman's single to right and then scored on Coles' single to right.

The Rangers exploded for three runs in the bottom of the sixth to take a 3-2 lead. With one out Scott Fletcher tripped to center and scored when the relay throw by shortstop Alan Trammell bounced into the Detroit dugout. Pete O'Brien followed with a walk and Incaviglia followed with a towering home run off Dave LaPoint over the left-field wall.

It was rookie Incaviglia's fifth home run of the season.

The Rangers added a run in the seventh when Toby Harrah singled home Oddibe McDowell from second.
