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
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
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**Connors returns to form in Wimbledon warm-up**

LONDON (AP) — Jimmy Connors, as feisty as ever, ended his 10-week suspension Tuesday with a thrashing of his first-round opponent and a lashing of the tennis establishment.

"I missed playing tennis and missed seeing people filling the stands," the 33-year-old left-hander said after he easily defeated Michiel Schapers of the Netherlands 6-1, 6-2. "But I enjoyed being away from all the garbage that goes on in tennis and all the people trying to making it a non-democracy-style event."

Connors was fined \$25,000 and given a 10-week suspension by the Men's International Professional Tennis Council (MIPTC) because he walked off the court following an argument with officials during his semifinal match against Ivan Lendl in the Lipton International Players Championships in Boca Raton, Fla., in February. The fine was the largest ever assessed against a player.

"I bet you waited 10 weeks for this," Connors joked when he began his postmatch news conference following his first-round match in the \$237,400 Stella Artois Grass Courts Championships at Queens Club.

A five-time U.S. Open champion and twice a winner at Wimbledon, Connors said that because of his age he is slowing down his schedule. But he continued to rail against the tennis establishment.

"There doesn't seem to be any commotion and it's always the player's fault," he said.

"You're being told when to play, where to play. The next step is to tell you how to win or lose."

"Contrary to a lot of people's thinking, come to see the players."

He said he enjoyed his time off.

"I took five weeks off before coming out and didn't play at all for 4 1/2 weeks."

Connors was especially critical of Billie Jean King, who was in the chair at the tournament. The incident was touched off when she was arguing a baseline call on a ball hitting the net.

"Maybe next time, if I know what I'm doing, I wouldn't go crazy. I'll pull him out of the court. It would be my last match, but I'd have a good one."

In other matches Tuesday, defending champion Boris Becker of West Germany defeated Andre Flach 6-2, 6-2, and Mike DePalmer of the U.S. needed two minutes less than three hours for his first-round victory over Britain's John Lloyd 19-17. Last year, DePalmer upset Connors in a first-round match.

**Sutton seeks 300th victory**

CHICAGO (AP) — What does Don Sutton think about now that he's just one pitching victory short of the 300-win goal?

More goals.

Sutton was asked what those might be after earning his 299th win with a 3-0 two-hitter over the Chicago White Sox Monday night. His answer said a lot about the kind of pitcher who keeps on winning after age 40.

"Seven hundred starts, 5,000 innings and whatever I can think of after I get that," he said.

"Look at the people who are playing longer," said the 41-year-old right-hander, who has made 683 starts and pitched 4,837 innings in his career. "They're motivated by some-

thing other than money. They're goal-oriented, motivated by high standards, high expectations they place on themselves. (Steve) Carlton makes heavy demands on himself. Pete Rose is very goal-oriented. I am, too."

His immediate goal, though, is that coveted 300th win, which will place him on a plateau only 18 pitchers have ever reached.

"I've wanted to win 300 games and get into the Hall of Fame almost since I've known there was one," said Sutton, 4-5.

He'll get his first chance at home Saturday against Kansas City.

"If I had my druthers I'd like to get it at home," said Sutton. "That

would make everything a lot easier. But at this stage of the game, it'll be the same."

One man who understands Sutton's ambitions was on Monday, the White Sox — a 41-year-old right-hander who has already hit the 300-win mark.

"He's going to feel better," said Sutton. "He's worked a lot of innings to 299, and now he has to get that one, getting it is exciting."

Seaver, who won his last August, allowed only one run in the seven innings he pitched in a three-run home run inning by Doug DeCinces. It was all Sutton needed.

**Past champs Italy, Argentina into second round of World Cup**

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Defending champion Italy and 1978 winner Argentina, both looking shaky and sometimes lethargic, eased into the second round of the World Cup Tuesday.

Argentina beat Bulgaria 2-0 to clinch Group A, while the Italians wound up second in the division after a 3-2 decision over South Korea. With a 2-0-1 record, the Argentinians secured a berth opposite one of the four third-place qualifiers for the next round. That game will be played next Monday in Puebla.

At Puebla on Tuesday, Italy upped its record to 1-0-2 behind a hat trick by Sandro Altobelli, who has scored all five of his team's goals in the tournament. The Italians will face European champion France here next Tuesday.

FIFA, the international governing body for soccer, confirmed Tuesday night that Mexico, Paraguay and West Germany also have made the next round after the results of Monday and Tuesday. The hosts and Paraguay each have three points and the worst they could do — even with Wednesday losses in Group B to Iraq and Belgium respectively — is earn

one of the berths awarded to the four best third-place teams.

West Germany can finish no worse than third in Group E with its three points and that would be enough to advance.

Argentina scored early and late to down the Bulgarians, who showed virtually no attack. Bulgaria has never won a World Cup game in 15 tries, going 0-9-6.

Coach Carlos Bilardo said after the game that his team, which lacked spark Tuesday, was "not afraid of anyone" left in the tournament.

"Argentina has to win now and we don't mind who we are going to face in the knockout stage," Bilardo said.

With its two points on ties with Italy and South Korea, Bulgaria held an outside chance of grabbing one of the four berths given to third-place teams for the next round.

Argentina's Jorge Valdano put in a header at three minutes. Defender Jose Cuciuffo went around Alexander Markov down the right side and his pinpoint pass was headed into the net by Valdano for his third goal of the tournament.

In the 76th minute, Jorge Buruchaga clinched it by heading a cen-

tering pass from Sandro Altobelli high into the net. Argentina suddenly broke down his pass found Buruchaga perfectly positioned at the post.

Altobelli's three-goal performance was enough for Italy to finish second in Group A, which finished behind West Germany. The third score went to the defender Cho Kwang-rae. He insisted he deserved the goal.

"I hit the ball," Altobelli said. "The ball did not touch it."

Altobelli's mind was on the trophy as much as on the goal when Italy was embarking on its rearguard team.

"I felt it was perfect," a beaming Altobelli said. "I was a young boy and I felt it was such a big moment. I should never have missed it."

"I am happy I contributed to this win. Nobody would have won without this win. Nobody would have won without any Korea again."

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
