Odessa bank officer testifies discovering unreported loans

MIDLAND (AP) — An Odessa bank president submitted his resignation just days after a bank officer found stacks of unreported loans inside the president's desk, the bank's current president testified Wednesday.

Included among the loans never approved by the bank's loan committee were three loans for a business in which former Bank of the West President Bill Tapp allegedly had an undisclosed interest, testified Dale Holloway, the bank's current president.

Holloway also said that after Tapp quit the bank in March 1984, banking examiners required stockholders to pour more than \$1 million capital into the bank.

In testimony Tuesday in Midland federal court, Holloway told jurors that Tapp personally made three 1983 loans from his bank to Donco Inspections Inc., a company in which Tapp allegedly owned a one-

third interest. Those loans were not presented to a bank board for approval, said Holloway, who in 1983 was the bank's vice president.

Another witness in the federal embezzlement trial of the 42-year-old Tapp told jurors Tuesday that Tapp's name intentionally was kept off stock certificates for the borrowing company.

Tapp's trial on 13 counts of embezzlement, misapplication of bank funds and falsifying bank records began Tuesday in U.S. District Court in Midland.

Assistant U.S. attorneys Jim Blankinship and Tom McHugh, who are prosecuting the case, planned to complete their evidence this week, possibly by Thursday.

Dallas attorney Frank Wright, who is representing Tapp, told jurors that he planned to call Tapp to the stand when the defense takes its turn.

 dom, whether it's academic, political or intellectual.

Thomas said the signee's worries ultimately center around a fear that the research cannot be judged or evaluated by other scientists. He called those fears "hogwash" and noted that other types of private research has restrictions also.

Dr. John Kogut, professor of physics at Illinois University, co-drafted the original petition that has been circulating at other universities around the country.

So far, he says 3,700 full-time faculty and about 2,800 graduate students have signed the petition. Fifteen Nobel laureates have also added their names.

A status report on the national petition states that in each of the 109 physical science and engineering research departments in the country,

50 percent or more of the faculty have pledged not to participate.

Fifty-seven percent of the combined faculties of the top 20 physics departments in the United States have signed, as ranked by the Chronicle of Higher Education.

Dr. Sanford Gottlieb, executive director of United Campuses to Prevent Nuclear War, said this is the first time the scientific community has refused on a nation-wide scale to do research on a major weapons system.

"This is unprecedented," Gottlieb said. "It's a successful effort to say to Congress that there is an important, informed constituency out there that is not going to go play along with Star Wars."

But SDI officials seem undaunted by the petition. They report that they have received more requests for funds than they can approve.
