Lockheed head admits laxness in handling of secrets

WASHINGTON (AP) — The chairman of Lockheed Corp. admitted to Congress on Thursday that his company has been sloppy in its handling of secret documents, but said there is no evidence any of the papers fell into Soviet hands.

"Our internal laxness... is inexcusable," Lawrence O. Kitchen told the House Energy and Commerce investigations subcommittee.

Neither Kitchen nor any of the congressmen at the hearing would say what the documents involve, but sources who have declined to be named say the papers concern the highly secret F-19 "stealth" fighter.

Kentucky Fried Chicken sells out

Sold! For \$850 million

NEW YORK (AP) — PepsiCo Inc. announced Thursday it has reached an agreement in principle to purchase Kentucky Fried Chicken Corp. from RJR Nabisco Inc. for about \$850 million in cash.

Kentucky Fried Chicken is the second largest restaurant chain in the world — after McDonald's Corp. — with its 6,500 franchised and company-owned restaurants.

PepsiCo already operates Pizza Hut and Taco Bell restaurants, in addition to its Pepsi-Cola soft drink

and Frito-Lay snack foods businesses.

The combination would create the world's largest restaurant group, with more than 14,000 restaurants.

PepsiCo, the No. 2 soft drink maker behind Coca-Cola Co., earlier this month announced it acquired the international operations of Seven-Up Co. from Philip Morris Co. for \$246 million in cash. That announcement came after the Federal Trade Commission objected on antitrust grounds to PepsiCo's earlier deal to acquire the domestic and in-

ternational divisions of Seven-Up.

The Kentucky Fried Chicken agreement is subject to the negotiation of a definitive agreement by government agencies and approval by the board of directors of both companies, PepsiCo said.

"KFC is an excellent strategic fit for PepsiCo and a logical extension of our existing businesses," said Wayne Calloway, chairman and chief executive officer of PepsiCo, which has headquarters in Purchase, N.Y.

School board bans Shakespeare play

TORONTO (AP) — Ninth-graders in an Ontario school threw coins at Jewish students and scrawled swastikas on their desks after the class began studying William Shakespeare's classic drama of Shylock, the Jewish

moneylender.

Parents complained and the local school board banned "The Merchant of Venice" until the Education Ministry or Human Rights Commission rules whether it is anti-Semitic.

Stock market shows moderate decline

NEW YORK (AP) — Railroad issues suffered some of the biggest losses as the stock market declined moderately Thursday.

Analysts said traders, still cautious about the economic outlook, shied away from extending the

mild rally in stock prices since the start of the week.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials, up 20.39 points from Monday through Wednesday's close, dropped back 6.75 to 1,791.62.

New subsidies to aid farm exports battle

WASHINGTON (AP) — A single California farming operation will harvest \$20 million in federal subsidies this year, part of a bumper crop of multimillion-dollar payments that the government is laying out in America's struggle to regain its former dominance in farm exports.

"Multimillion-dollar payments in rice and cotton will not be uncommon," Robert Thompson, the Agriculture Department's chief economist, said recently.

Rep. Tony Coelho, D-Calif., a member of the House Agriculture Committee, which helped write the law, said, "They're going to be big,

and very controversial. We had that when we did this. But the way to turn it around is to get the big guys cooperating so we can be the family farmer as well."

The estimates are that the government will lay out upwards of \$1 billion for farm aid this year.

The apparent top recipients of subsidies under the new farm law are agribusiness giant J.G. Boswell Co.

Figures computed by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, the Agriculture Department's subsidy arm, show that well will collect nearly \$10.4 million in payments on those crops
