



### Foreclosure planed 'will not weaken Cho holdings of Hunter nt Reas

and other lenders to foreclose on property owned by the Hunt family in two Texas counties and Missis-

sippi will not weaken the family's holdings, a spokesman said.

The Hunt spokesman said the postings by RepublicBank Dallas and the other lenders were no surprise and resulted from lawsuits filed by brothers - Nelson Bunker, William Herbert and Lamar Hunt against 23 banks. The spokesman was not identified by the Dallas Morning News in a Thursday story about the foreclosures.

"The banks are attempting to exert pressure on the Hunt interests, and the banks mistakenly believe that they will weaken the Hunts," said the spokesman. "But that's not

going to happen."

The foreclosure postings also include stock from subsidiaries of the Hunt brothers' Placid Oil Co., according to a source close to the

## Plastic on beaches 'Public Enemy No. 1'

AUSTIN (AP) — A committee for the Texas Coastal Cleanup wasted no time Thursday identifying what may be its Public Enemy No. 1 -

Kathy O'Hara, a Washington, D.C., biologist for the Center for Environmental Education, said the same qualities that make plastic valuable in everyday life — "it's light, strong and very durable" — also causes problems. She spoke to the steering committee for the Texas The center, a non-profit marine

conservation organization, is sponsoring a Texas coastal cleanup from 10 cities on Sept. 20, but Roger Mc-Manus, head of the center, said, "I hope it won't just be a nice little

cleanup on the beach."

Linda Maraniss of the center's
Gulf States regional office in Austin
said the organization is "looking for long-lasting solutions."
The problem of debris on beaches

'relates to individual behavior," said McManus, and the organization's task is to change the way people think about littering beaches.
Slide shows by O'Hara and Tony Amos, a University of Texas ocean-

ographer at Port Aransas, illustrated the problem: fish and seabirds entangled in plastic six-pack rings; sea turtles mistaking floating plastic bags for jellyfish and swallowing them; seabirds pecking at plastic pel-
