House begins debate on \$6 billion drug bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House began debate Wednesday on a multi-billion dollar drug bill, a day after House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill Jr. bluntly told President Reagan the effort will cost much more than the administration appears willing to spend.

"Drug traffickers beware, this Congress means business," Rep. Jimmy Quillen, R-Tenn., said.

House Majority Leader Jim Wright, D-Texas, admitted the bill "will not solve all of the problems" but said it would "permit us

to make progress rather than losing ground."

O'Neill said that at a White House meeting Tuesday, attended by President Reagan, budget chief James Miller III said \$250 million would be available for a new drug initiative.

The speaker said he later received a call from the White House, in which he was told the figure cited by Miller, director of the Office of Management and Budget, was too low.

"When Jim Miller started talk-

ing about \$250 million, I said we could stop the program if that's all you have in mind," O'Neill said.

The Congressional Budget Office reported Tuesday the bill could cost some \$6 billion through 1991 if all programs are fully financed and all new enforcement personnel hired are retained.

However, since the measure only authorizes spending levels, it does not guarantee that Congress will appropriate all the money.

Studies: Suicide stories add to problem

BOSTON (AP) — News and feature stories about suicide, as well as television movies on the subject, seem to induce teen-agers to take their own lives, two new studies conclude.

The research suggests that even well-intentioned examinations of the rising suicide rate can prompt troubled adolescents to kill themselves. However, experts are unsure what, if anything, the news media should change in their portrayal of suicide.

Dr. Leon Eisenberg of Harvard Medical School said, "I don't think we should not tell the public that the

suicide rate is going up. That would be ridiculous. Yet if this is right, that may be some sort of stimulus to people who are thinking about it. I don't know what the solution is."

Although the studies concluded that teen-age suicides increase after television news programs or movies dealing with suicide, neither showed that the victims had seen the programs.

Dr. David P. Phillips of the University of California at San Diego found that the nationwide suicide rate among teen-agers was 7 percent higher than usual following 38 tele-

vision news and feature stories about suicide during the 1970s.

Dr. Madelyn S. Gould of Columbia University found that the number of teen-age suicide attempts in the New York City area rose significantly following three of four major-for-television movies about suicide that were broadcast during the fall of 1984 and winter of 1985.

Both studies suggested that teen-agers imitate suicides they see about on television. The reports were published in Thursday's England Journal of Medicine, along with an editorial by Eisenberg.

Abzug wins Democratic nomination

(AP) — Former Rep. Bella Abzug won a narrow victory Wednesday for the Democratic nomination to the House from suburban New York, while leaders of the women's political movement she helped pioneer celebrated a string of primary successes from Connecticut to Arizona.

The other women winners ranged from Democratic Rep. Barbara Mikulski in Maryland's senatorial primaries to Julie Belaga in Connecticut's GOP governor's race and Carolyn Warner in Arizona's Democratic governor's race. Kathleen Kennedy Townsend, the daughter of the late Robert F. Kennedy, made her political debut a successful one with a victory in a House Democratic primary in Maryland.

Abzug claimed victory Tuesday night in her four-way battle for the nomination to face GOP Rep. Joseph DioGuardi. But it wasn't until late the next morning — 17 hours after the polls closed — that nearly complete returns validated her win. She was polling 36 percent of the vote, to 34 percent for her closest rival, Oren Teicher.

Ann Lewis, national director of the liberal Americans for Democratic Action, said, "She's a founding mother" of the women's political movement.

Irene Natividad, executive director of the National Women's Political Caucus, called the outcome "a major comeback for one of the founders of the movement, one of the major instigators of getting women involved in politics."

Laurence A. Tisch, CBS's largest shareholder and also a director, was named acting chief executive officer by the company's board, which met all day. "The CBS Evening News" reported.

CBS will seek a permanent replacement, the "News" said.

Egypt, Israel ready for summit meeting

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — Egyptian and Israeli negotiators reached agreement Wednesday night on a formula for settling a lingering border dispute, opening the way for the two countries' first summit meeting in five years.

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 15 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among the counties in which the property of the railroad is located for purposes of property taxation, and would delete the requirement that the Comptroller participate in making the allocation. To comply with both statutory and constitutional law, the apportionment currently is being made by the State Property Tax Board in conjunction with the Comptroller.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among counties for purposes of property taxation."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 33 proposes a constitutional amendment that would replace the constitutional requirement that the subject of a bill be expressed in its title with a mandate that each house of the legislature adopt rules of procedure that would require the subject of each bill to be expressed in its title in a manner that gives the legislature and the public reasonable notice of that subject. Determining compliance with the rule would be the responsibility of the legislature. Currently, a law is invalidated if a court finds its caption is defective. The amendment would provide that past and future enactments may not be held void on the basis of an insufficient title.

The amendment also would eliminate the suggestion that the state's laws be revised every ten years, and instead would provide for continuing revision of state laws.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment requiring each house to include in its rules of procedure a rule that each bill contain a title expressing the bill's subject, and providing for the continuing revision of state laws."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the Legislature to authorize any county, city, town, or other political subdivision to use public funds or credit to pay insurance premiums on nonassessable life, health, or accident policies. Due to the prohibition in the constitution against the lending of credit and granting of public money, political subdivisions currently are prohibited from becoming shareholders in associations such as mutual insurance companies, in which policyholders are shareholders. A nonassessable mutual insurance policy does not allow a company to raise capital by assessing the policyholder an extra amount on a pre-

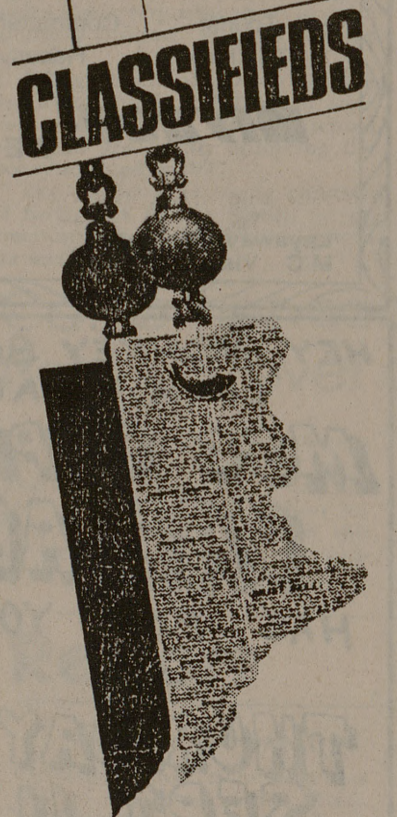
