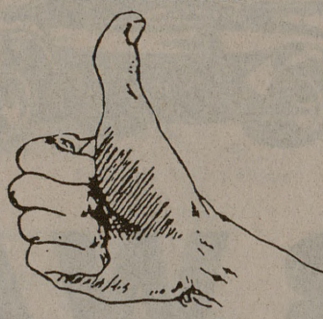

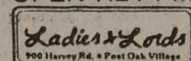


Number One in Aggeland

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Humor does exist past closed doors of the White House

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich. (AP) — How does a former president who was mimicked mercilessly for slipping and tripping get back at the comedian who made the most of the pratfalls?

That's just what Gerald Ford did Thursday, stretching a leg out in front of Chevy Chase, who made a name for himself imitating Ford on television's "Saturday Night Live."

The pair staged the gag before the start of the second day of events during a three-day Humor and the Presidency Symposium at the Gerald R. Ford Museum.

Later in the day, comedian Pat Paulsen moderated a panel that looked at the history of presidential humor.

"Ford was president for two years and he left us with eight years of laughs," Paulsen said.

But it's not all fun. Life in the White House can get dull, though there may be a way out, Paulsen suggested. "If you're a dull president, is it necessary to have a funny vice president? If neither one of them are funny, would the problem be resolved by having Alexander Haig around?"

Paulsen also asked: "What president had the funniest family? I'll give you a hint: They were known for coming out with a product known as 'Billy Beer.'"

The symposium, which also included comic Mark Russell and several pundits and political operatives, is billed as a semi-serious look at the

laughs generated by the nation's chief executives.

James Free, historian of Washington's Gridiron Club, opened some eyes with anecdotes about how presidents let down their hair when the conversations were off-the-record.

President Reagan once told the gathering he wasn't worried about the federal deficit, Free said.

"It's big enough to take care of itself," Free quoted the president as saying.

Free said Reagan, John F. Kennedy and Franklin Roosevelt were the funniest of the 17 presidents who appeared at Gridiron Club dinners.

Panelist Gerald Gardner, author of a new book "All The President's Wits," said Reagan has used humor to attack communism.

Reagan, at a meeting in Geneva, told Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev a joke about a Soviet citizen and a U.S. citizen comparing their freedoms.

"I can walk into the Oval Office of the White House and I can slam my fist on the desk and I can say 'I don't like the way you're running the United States,'" the American said.

Responded the Soviet: "Well I can do the same thing at the Politburo. I can go into Gorbachev's office and slam my fist on the desk and say 'I don't like the way Ronald Reagan is running the United States.'"

Witnesses identify 2 in Paris store bombing

PARIS (AP) — Witnesses identified two purported members of a Lebanese extremist group as the men who bombed a discount clothing store in the latest terrorist attack here, a judicial source said Thursday.

In Beirut, Lebanon, a group calling itself the Partisans for Justice and Freedom claimed responsibility for Wednesday's bombing that killed five people and wounded 52 at the store.

Premier Jacques Chirac said France's response to the series of bombings, which have killed eight people and wounded more than 150, would be "crushing and without weakness."

"We will do everything — and I mean everything — to punish without pity the assassins and those who manipulate them," he said in a three-minute address on national television.

The judicial official, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said witnesses to the Wednesday attack on the Tati store in the Montparnasse district identified Emile Ibrahim Abdallah and Salim el-Khoury from police photographs as the men who

tossed a bomb from a black BMW car.

Besides the Partisans for Justice and Freedom, another group calling itself the Committee for Solidarity with Arab and Middle East Political Prisoners, claims responsibility for the other Paris attacks.

The second group has demanded the release from French prison of Georges Ibrahim Abdallah, who is serving a four-year prison term for possession of arms and false papers.

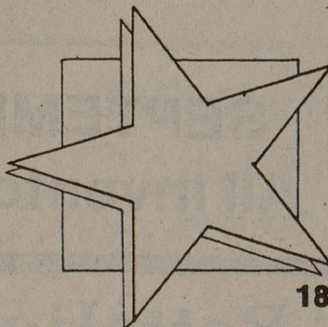
Emile Abdallah is the brother of Georges, thought by French authorities to be the leader of the extremist Lebanese Armed Revolutionary Factions. Khoury, 31, the subject of an international arrest warrant issued by French police, is wanted in connection with the 1985 kidnapping of the director of the French cultural center in the northern Lebanese city of Tripoli. The kidnapped Frenchman was released.

The two suspects in Wednesday's bombing were believed to be members of the Lebanese Armed Revolutionary Factions, the judicial source said.

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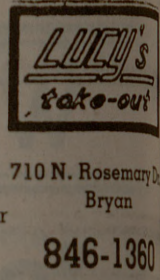
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
