Chirac urges U.N. fight against world terrorism

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — Prime Minister Jacques Chirac of France urged the United Nations on Wednesday to stamp out international terrorism, which has cost his country nine lives in the past two weeks.
Chirac told the 41st General Assembly that terrorism is the most urgent challenge to the world and requires concrete counter-measures, including joint action to improve security in the air and on the sea.
"The tragic events in Istanbul, Karachi and Paris prove once again that terrorism has become the systematic weapon of a war that knows no borders or seldom has a face," Chirac told delegates.
Nine people have been killed and more than 160 injured in five bombings in Paris since Sept. 8.

Terrorists stormed a synagogue in Istanbul, Turkey, on Sept. 6, killing 21 worshippers.
Twenty people were killed after hijackers opened fire inside a Pan Am jetliner in Karachi, Pakistan, on Sept. 5.
Chirac reminded delegates that among terrorism's victims are the French, American and British hostages held in Lebanon.
Word of another French kidnap victim in Lebanon came Wednesday, when a group called Revolutionary Justice claimed it abducted a man the group called a French secret service agent.
In his speech, Chirac said countries have not always shown the necessary lucidity toward terrorism.
"Some would like us to think this

is the sole means of expressing oppressed," he said.
Chirac addressed the 41st assembly during the period of general debate, when top officials of states discuss current issues.
He condemned states which close their eyes to terrorist organizations' activities, and those that hesitate to use them to their own advantage.
He also said France supports proposals for an international conference on the Israeli-Arab conflict, any solution must recognize the right to exist and its security concerns, as well as Palestinians' right to self-determination.
On another Middle East issue, Chirac said French troops were in an intolerable situation with the UN peacekeeping force in Lebanon.

Soviet writer: location for Chernobyl bad

(AP) In an article linking the Chernobyl disaster with a history of Soviet bureaucratic bungling, a leading newspaper on Wednesday criticized the choice of an often-flooded riverbank as site for the nuclear power plant.
Officials didn't prepare for the possibility of an accident, said Ukrainian writer Boris Oleinik in the weekly newspaper Literary Gazette.
Oleinik traced the negligence which he blamed for the Chernobyl disaster to a long history of bureaucratic ineptitude in the country as a whole. Oleinik's article was the latest in a series of pieces about the Chernobyl accident, which killed at least 31 people.
"There are many reasons for contemplation," Oleinik wrote. "But above all, many people have started to doubt the correctness of the site which was selected for the plant."

The Chernobyl station was started in the mid-1970s on the banks of the Pripyat River.
"It (the Pripyat) has low banks, which is important during the four-month spring flooding when water inundates significant areas," Oleinik said.
Soviet officials have said the Chernobyl disaster prompted a review of nuclear plant locations, which are often close to large population centers.
Oleinik said officials ignored warnings of problems at Chernobyl, including an article printed in March by the Ukrainian literary newspaper.
That article focused on construction of the plant's fifth reactor, halted after the accident, and told of problems in delivering supplies, substandard equipment, and machinery delivered either broken or with obvious defects.

Study shows young adults read poorly

WASHINGTON (AP) — A new study indicates the United States has the world's highest rate of basic literacy, but many young adults stumble when asked to glean information from a schedule or decipher a road map, testing experts said Wednesday.
The National Assessment of Educational Progress said tests gave Americans in their early last year found 6 percent not read as well as the area fourth-grader, 20 percent not read as well as an eighth grader, and 38.5 percent unable to read at an eleventh grade level.
Blacks lagged far behind whites on the reading tests, Hispanics scoring in between.
The report, "Literacy: Profile of America's Young Adults," said more than 99 percent of the tested could sign their names, Social Security form or write five simple sentences describing job they would like.
But 43 percent had trouble following directions on a map, 20 percent were stumped by a question that required them to read the fine print on a schedule.
Secretary of Education William J. Bennett, whose department commissioned the \$2 million study, commented in a statement, "The United States is not poor in illiteracy, but most of our young people are not very literate."
"For the \$263 billion spent on education last year, we should do better than this."
The 3,600 young adults tested at home last year were said to be representative of all 21 million Americans ages 21 to 25.

Europeans funding probe, could land on comet by '95

NEW YORK (AP) — The European Space Agency has committed \$400 million to land a space probe on a comet and bring back some of its nucleus to Earth, a scientist said Wednesday.
"We're not just talking about a hypothetical mission — it's going to fly," John Wood of the Harvard-Smithsonian Center for Astrophysics in Cambridge, Mass., said. The launch could come as early as 1995, he said, but will probably be at least several years later.
Wood, a geologist, is a member of a committee of U.S. and European scientists who have been meeting for a year to propose experiments for

the unmanned flight to the ESA. He delivered a report on the status of the mission to the Meteoritical Society, which is holding its annual meeting this week.
The mission could give scientists their first look at an unadulterated sample of the primitive interstellar dust that combined with gases around the sun 4.5 billion years ago to form the planets, Wood said.
Only once before have extraterrestrial materials been harvested and brought back to Earth — in a series of manned Apollo missions to the moon in the 1970s.
