WICHITA FALLS — The Texas A&M men's tennis team registered two singles victories and a couple near-misses Sunday over Southern

In the No. 3 singles, A&M's Dean Johnson beat John Ross 1-6, 7-6, 6-2, while Aggie Chris Stanich domi-nated John Coyle 6-1, 6-2 in the No.

Steelers' overtime TD drops Oilers, 22-16

HOUSTON (AP) — Pittsburgh's Rick Woods returned a punt 41 yards in overtime to set up Walter Abercrombie's 3-yard touchdown run that gave the Steelers a 22-16 NFL victory Sunday over the Houston Oilers.

Steelers quarterback Mark Malone scrambled 11 yards on a bootleg prior to Abercrombie's scoring run that gave Pittsburgh its first win of the year, snapping a three-game losing streak.

Pittsburgh's Gary Anderson kicked his third field goal of the game, a 28-yarder, to give the Steel-ers a 16-13 lead with 2:23 seconds left in regulation play. Malone ran 45 yards on another bootleg play to set up Anderson's kick.


Houston drove back to tie it with 9:56 left in the game on Zendejas' second field goal, a 29-yarder. The Oilers' offense struggled
