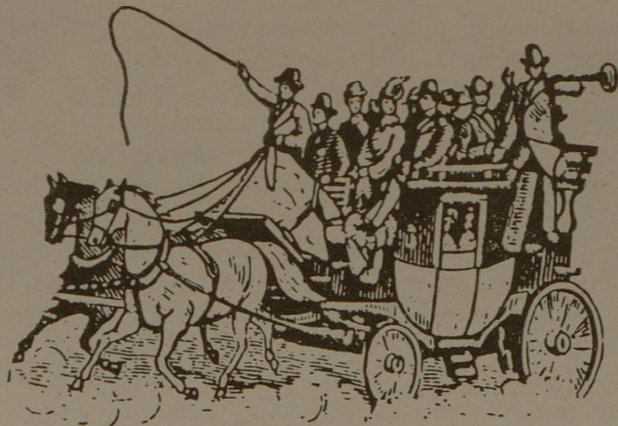
Westfest corrals fun in Bryan

Orchestra will blend music in unique concert 'Collage'

The Brazos Valley Symphony Orchestra will feature an eclectic blend of music in "Collage" at Rudder Auditorium this Wednesday at 8 p.m.

The performance will draw on a wide range of musical styles, from the classical compositions of Mozart and Debussy to the modern brass of Leo Arnaud to the Haitian drumming patterns of a

violent voodoo ritual.

Sections of the orchestra will be placed throughout the auditorium and will be highlighted on individual pieces. Each section will play a series of contrasting pieces which were designed to flow from one musical section to another.

The Singing Cadets, Century Singers and members of the Texas

A&M Symphonic Band will be appearing with the orchestra.
