Lancaster and Douglas are excellent and are almost able to pull the film out of the stock cliches about old folks. Charles Durning is also pretty good as the sheriff who caught Lancaster and Douglas the first time and who is out to get them again. The actors are much better than the screenplay they were stuck with.

The ambiguity of the picture and the fact that he can't find a body make him wonder whether there was a murder. The story takes place in the pop environment and cultural background of the "in crowd" during the swinging '60s. Starring David Hemmings and Vanessa Redgrave. Watch Jimmy Page smash his guitar during the Yardbirds' concert in the film.
