 two-run triple, and the Mets had a 5-0 lead.
 The Astros picked up right where they left off in the series opener, squandering one scoring chance after another until finally breaking through in the seventh. Pinch-hitter Terry Puhl singled to lead off. He was forced at second on Hatcher's ground ball, and Hatcher went to second on Bill Doran's slow roller to first. Garner followed with a run-

scoring single to center.
 With one out in the second, Kevin Bass doubled to the wall in left-center. Jose Cruz then hit a line drive back to Ojeda, who deflected it toward shortstop. Cruz was aboard with an infield hit, and Bass went to third. Ashby followed with a checked-swing bouncer in front of the plate. Ojeda fielded the ball and beat Bass to the plate.
 Hatcher cost the Astros another chance with a baserunning blunder in the third inning. With one out, he

singled to center field, and he was off-and-running when Doran hit a soft looper over the head of second baseman Backman. Backman caught the ball on the run in center field for one out as Hatcher rounded second base, and he threw to first base, doubling off Hatcher, to end the inning.
 The Astros had runners at first and second with one out in the fourth, but Cruz struck out and Mets third baseman Ray Knight backhanded an Ashby grounder for an inning-ending forceout.

 opponents. The two quarterbacks, along with Tate and Hood have combined for 971 yards rushing in their first four games.
 Unfortunately for the 1-3 Cougars, their opponents have totaled almost 1,500 yards on the ground, as well as 579 more yards through the air.
 Davis attributes much of the Cougars' offensive woes to an inexperienced offensive line that starts one freshman, three sophomores and one junior. But Davis added that he thought the line has come a long way, especially after last week's 27-13 loss to Baylor.
 "I think Baylor showed us a lot of different looks," Davis said. "A couple of guys got their very first taste

of what Southwest Conference football is all about."
 But Kelm said the Aggies are by no means taking the Cougars lightly or looking ahead to next weekend's game with Baylor.
 "I don't think that (looking ahead to Baylor) is a problem," Kelm said. "As much trouble as Houston has given us in the past, we know this is a big ballgame for us. We need a win."
 In much the same fashion as last year's Cotton Bowl season, the A&M defense has been this team's strong point, especially over the last three games. And the unsung hero of that defense has undoubtedly been Kelm, who last year led the defense in tackles and currently trails Johnny Holland by only four tackles.
 But for Kelm, a civil engineer major from Corpus Christi, publicity

isn't nearly as important as the productivity of the Aggie defense.
 "It (the lack of publicity) doesn't bother me," he said. "That's just the way it's going to be. He (Holland) played his sophomore year and did a real good job. He had a lot of publicity going into last year and this year too."
 "But I also think a lot of the publicity he gets comes from how well the defense plays as a whole."
 When asked if the Cougars had a specific area with which they could hurt the Aggies, Davis replied, "Not really. We are just going to line up and play the best we can. A&M has a tremendous defense. . . . The only thing we can do is play our best."
 The Aggies, of course, will be doing their best to break the Houston jinx.
