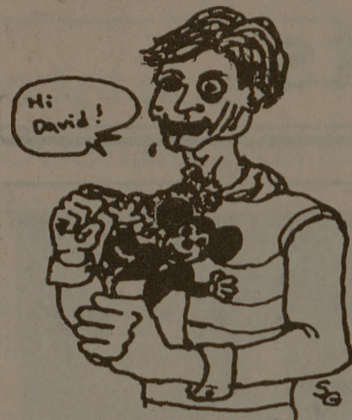

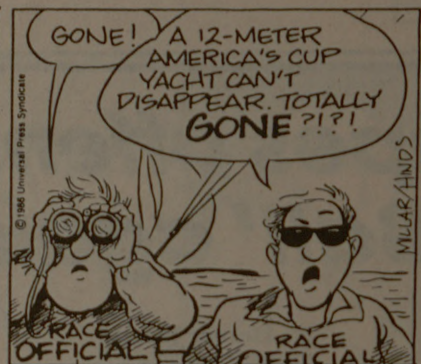
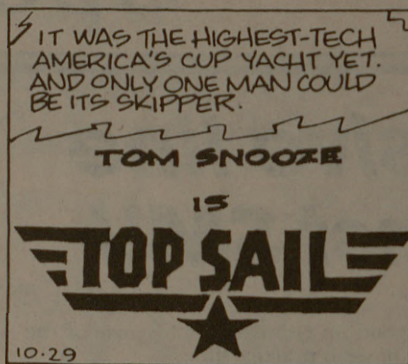

Arkansas cornerback earns SWC player of week honors

Baylor quarterback Carlson receives offensive accolade

LITTLE ROCK (AP) — A couple of days before the Houston game, Arkansas cornerback Charles Washington was passing by the office of defensive coordinator Fred Goldsmith.

"We've got a big game coming up against Houston," Goldsmith told Washington. "You need to get an interception to keep up with the one from last year."

Washington, a fifth-year senior, reminded Goldsmith that he had made an interception in each of his three appearances against the Cougars. On Saturday night, in the Astrodome, he picked off two more passes and Goldsmith said, "Well, it looks like you went over your limit."

Washington's first interception came with 35 seconds left in the half. Less than two minutes earlier, Ar-

kansas broke a 6-6 tie on Marshall Foreman's 19-yard run. Washington's 32-yard return to the Houston 35 set up Kendall Trainor's 51-yard field goal and a 16-6 lead.

In the fourth quarter, he picked off a pass to set up the final touchdown in a 30-13 victory.

For his performance, Washington was named The Associated Press Defensive Player of the Week in the Southwest Conference.

Baylor quarterback Cody Carlson is the Offensive Player of the Week in the SWC. He threw for 312 yards and three touchdowns, including bombs of 72 and 86 yards in the fourth quarter, in a 28-17 victory over Texas Christian.

Arkansas Coach Ken Hatfield said Washington made a terrific play on his first interception.

"The receiver is right at Hatfield said. "Somehow he has his balance and doesn't get knocked down. He pulls out of that and you know, I think he has a score."

Going from a tie to a 16-6 in 2:11 was a big lift for the backs, he said.

"We were anticipating that would try to get a big play," Hatfield said. "I was worried about the quarterback. Once he threw the ball, I felt the guy coming and reversed my outside shoulder. I had seen a lot of quarterbacks do it when they were rushed. I tried it and it worked."

Cowboys receive right stuff in speedy rookie Sherrard

IRVING (AP) — Tex Schramm raised his fist in triumph when the Dallas Cowboys traded up to take wide receiver Mike Sherrard in the first round of the NFL draft.

"It's about time we finally did something right," Schramm said, who had been unhappy with the Cowboys' first-round mistakes the previous five years.

The Cowboys haven't been sorry a second since they took the speedy Sherrard, a rookie from UCLA who specializes in sensational catches.

"He gives something to our offense we've never had before," quarterback Danny White said. "He's so fast it's hard to lead him enough. And he has great hands. He makes the routine catches and he makes the great catches. It's impossible to overthrow him, and believe me I've tried."

Sherrard missed the first five weeks of training camp in a contract dispute, but the Cowboys knew what he could do because of his extensive work at Valley Ranch in the off-season.

"He'll open up our offense," Dallas coach Tom Landry said. "He'll take some of the double coverage off Tony Hill."

Sherrard still isn't being double-teamed by most clubs although he has caught touchdown passes of 22, 27, 36 and 39 yards.

"Teams don't give me a lot of respect deep and it's kind of funny because that's all I do is go deep," Sherrard said. "They kind of dare me to go deep."

Going deep, Sherrard caught five

passes for 111 yards in a 37-6 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals.

"Mike can go deep and it helps loosen up the defense if we can throw to him four or five times during a game," Dallas offensive coordinator Paul Hackett said. "And he has great hands besides great speed."

The 6-foot-2, 185-pound Sherrard has excellent speed lines.

His mother, Cherie, was a member of the 1964 U.S. Olympic team as an 80-meter hurdler. That was the same team that featured "bullet" Bob Hayes, who later became a Cowboys' receiver.

Hayes said, "You can see some similarities between her running style and Mike's."

Hill said Sherrard and back Herschel Walker are reasons the Cowboys are this year.

"We are so diversified that can't key on one thing," Hill said. "Sherrard has a flare for the tactical. He took a pass from Washington's Darrell Green end zone for a touchdown."

In Dallas' 31-7 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals on Sept. 29, Sherrard adjusted to a wobbling pass from back for the ball and made a 39-yard scoring catch.

"My college coach always told me to be aggressive going for the ball," Sherrard said. "It helps build confidence."

Mavericks reduce squad to 12-member league limit

DALLAS (AP) — Rookie guard Myron Jackson has made the Dallas Mavericks' 12-man squad, the NBA team announced Tuesday.

In reducing their roster to the league limit, the Mavericks also waived third-round draft choice Anthony Welch of Illinois and free agent Dennis Nutt of Texas Christian.

Jackson, 6-3, was the team's fourth-round draft choice from

Arkansas-Little Rock. He averaged 2.2 points in eight pregame games.

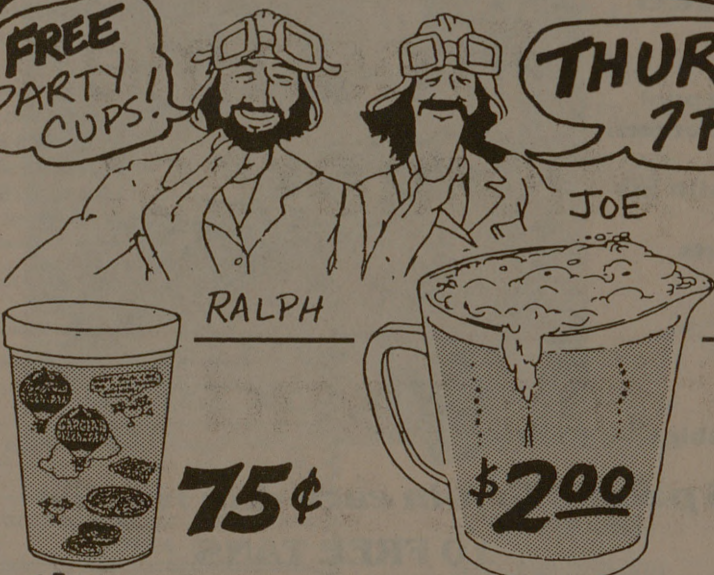
"It wasn't an easy call," Rick Sund said, the Mavericks' director of player personnel.
