HUNTSVILLE (AP) - Gov.-elect tacted by the Houston Chronicle, Bill Clements has demanded his resignation, but Texas Department of Corrections Director O.L. McCotter said he will stay as long as he has the support of the prison board.

"I think we've made some great strides forward in the past two years," McCotter said Wednesday. "We've reduced violence by 75 percent and I think that even the inmates will say that they feel safer than before.

The prison director said he would poll board members and then make a decision about his job.

"I've never been one to walk away from a fight, but I'll leave if they want me to, or think that by staying on, I'll hurt the agency," he said. Gov. Mark White, defeated by
