

Cowboys rally past Chargers for win

SAN DIEGO (AP)—Quarterback Steve Pelluer, after being sacked an NFL record-tying 12 times, scored on a 2-yard bootleg run with 1:37 to play Sunday as the Dallas Cowboys rallied from an 11-point deficit to post a 24-21 victory over the San Diego Chargers.

The Cowboys, who trailed 21-10 early in the fourth quarter, drove from their 39-yard line to the Chargers two before Pelluer rolled around right end for the deciding score. The Chargers had taken the lead behind quarterback Dan Fouts' two

touchdown passes to Kellen Winslow. After Pelluer's deciding touchdown, a fumble by Tony Dorsett that was recovered by the Chargers on the San Diego 10 with 42 seconds to play gave the Chargers a final chance.

San Diego drove to the Dallas 37, but after three incompletions, a 55-yard field goal try by Rolf Benirschke with one second remaining missed wide to the left.

The Cowboys had pulled within 21-17 on a one-yard run by Herschel Walker with 7:26 to play. That score

came three plays after Dallas defensive back Michael Downs had blocked a punt, giving the Cowboys the ball on the San Diego two.

Dallas improved its record to 7-4 and remained two games behind the NFC East-leading New York Giants, who beat Minnesota earlier Sunday. The Washington Redskins, 8-2, play San Francisco tonight.

The Chargers' defense stifled Dallas most of the game with a swarming pass rush. Rookie defensive end Leslie O'Neal led the Chargers with five sacks.

Fouts' second scoring pass to Winslow had given San Diego a 21-10 advantage. The score came three plays after a 42-yard pass interference call against Downs set the Chargers up with a first and goal at the Cowboys' six.

San Diego grabbed the lead for the first time midway through the third period. Winslow ran 28 yards for a touchdown after catching a screen pass behind the line of scrimmage.

Winslow's reception put San Diego in front, 14-10.

Mistake-prone Oilers lose to Steelers 21-10

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Pittsburgh turned an interception and a costly pass interference penalty into first-half touchdown runs by Walter Abernethy and Earnest Jackson as the Steelers, helped by a fourth-period goal line stand, beat the mistake-prone Houston Oilers 21-10 in the NFL Sunday.

The Oilers had two touchdowns and a field goal nullified by penalties during a scoreless second half even before they failed to score on four straight plays from the Steelers' one yard in the fourth quarter.

The Oilers, losing for the ninth time in their last 10 games, were trailing 21-10 when Warren Moon completions of 23 yards and 14 yards to Ernest Givins and a 26-yard pass interference call against Steelers' safety Donnie Shell gave Houston a first down at the Pittsburgh one.

But the Oilers were stopped for no gain on four successive plays from the one — with fullback Ray Wallace carrying three times and Moon once — as the Steelers, 4-7, held on to win for the third time in their last four games.

Houston, 2-9, also had an apparent eight-yard Wallace touchdown run and a 63-yard Moon to Allen Pinkett touchdown pass called back by penalties. A penalty also negated a 29-yard field goal by Tony Zendejas, who then missed from 39 yards out after the illegal use of hands call on tight end Jamie Williams.

Pittsburgh, beating Houston for the eighth time in their last nine meetings, took a 7-0 lead when Abernethy scored from eight yards out with 3:18 gone in the game after cornerback Harvey Clayton intercepted a Moon pass.

Moon's 33-yard touchdown pass to Givins made it 7-7 midway through the period before a 35-yard interference call on Oilers' cornerback Steve Brown gave Pittsburgh a first down at the Oilers' four. Jackson scored from the three a play later.

The Steelers made it 21-7 when Mark Malone hit Rich Erenberg on a 17-yard scoring pass with 12:04 remaining in the second quarter.

Zendejas kicked a 44-yarder late in the second period to make it 21-10.

Aggie offense off the field for over 17 minutes in the first half. The Aggie defense bent but didn't break as it held Arkansas to just seven points at the half.

After the interception, however, Arkansas came out fired up and kept pushing back the Aggies with its ground game on its way to its second touchdown.

But the A&M defense held when it needed to. Arkansas Coach Ken Hatfield gambled on a fourth-and-1 play late with four minutes left. A&M's Rod Saddler and Todd Howard stopped fullback Derrick Thomas just inches short of the first down to give the ball back to A&M for its final drive.

Overall, the A&M defense played well. It held the Razorbacks to 186 yards rushing, less than the 234.8 yards per game Arkansas was averaging. It was A&M's conservative

and inconsistent play on offense that hindered the team, however, and ended the Aggies' seven-game winning streak.

Woodside said he still foresees an A&M trip to Dallas on Jan. 1.

"We are a class team," Woodside said. "We know what our task is and we're going to make a comeback. . . . We can control our own destiny, no matter if it's TCU or Texas, we're still the team to beat for the Cotton Bowl."

While A&M still has the inside track on the Cotton Bowl with two games remaining, another Aggie loss could send Arkansas to the Bowl if the Hogs can beat SMU this Saturday. If A&M and Arkansas are both winners this weekend, then the annual A&M-Texas Thanksgiving grudge match again may determine the SWC champion. CBS reported Sunday that the loser of this Saturday's Michigan-Ohio State game will head to the Cotton Bowl.
