If convicted, Septien could be ntenced to up to life imprisonent and fined \$2,000, Cobb

Septien posted the bond at the

Denton County Jail about 5 p.m. Thursday, said Capt. Jim Neal, detention director.

"We are planning on entering a plea of not guilty, because he is not guilty of these charges," said Septien's attorney, Jay Ethington.

Septien, 33, joined the Cowboys in 1978 after attending Southwest Louisiana, and is the team's all-time leading scorer.

Police from The Colony, a suburb in Denton County where Septien lives, brought the case to the district attorney's office last week. Cobb said he declined to issue an arrest warrant until the grand jurors heard the case.

"We now have investigated the case and feel confident about it,"

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
