Government faces fight on random drug testing

WASHINGTON (AP) — Government plans to push for random drug testing of railroad and aviation workers are sure to face court challenges, but the Reagan administration hopes a lives-are-at-stake argument will win the day.

Only hours after Transportation Secretary Elizabeth Dole announced plans last week to impose a broad drug testing program at the airlines, railroads and in her own department, labor unions vowed to block the attempt in court.

Administration officials acknowledge that court challenges are likely since they have surfaced in virtually all drug-testing cases, including some involving the U.S. Customs Service, police departments and private industry.

But Dole says she's convinced she

might have a stronger case, even though her proposal includes periodic and random tests that would cover hundreds of thousands of workers — even where there is no suspicion of drug use.

"It seems to me that where you've got the safety and security responsibilities that we have in transportation, you have a very clear and strong case," she said. "You look at the balance between the safety and security needs of the public and the constitutional rights of the individual. There's no other area where a person's decision to use drugs would have a more disastrous impact than in transportation."

Dole said she had contemplated for some time a requirement for random drug testing among aviation and rail workers as well for Trans-

portation Department employees involved in safety or security jobs.

But until recently, department officials have shied away from random testing, preferring instead to focus on a requirement for tests only when there is probable cause or a question, especially when there are safety tests, have been upheld in court, while random tests have not.

Even the rail unions, which challenged probable cause tests and still have some cases under appeal, have begun to indicate they might go along with such tests. Pilots' union was ready to support a drug testing plan, based on probable cause, before Dole's announcement.

Both rail and aviation labor leaders, however, oppose random tests.

Conservatives win in West Germany but lose support

BONN, West Germany (AP) — West German voters returned Chancellor Helmut Kohl's conservative coalition to power Sunday, but reduced their support for his Christian Democratic Party. The anti-NATO Greens made impressive gains.

Computer projections, which have proved highly accurate in the past, showed a significant drop in support for Kohl's party compared with the last national elections, four years ago. But the results showed his coalition with the small Free Democratic Party was in no danger.

Johannes Rau, who ran for chancellor under the banner of the main opposition Social Democratic Party, conceded defeat on national television an hour after the polls closed at 6 p.m.

"We wanted a change in the government, and we didn't get it. We are the losers," Rau, the governor of North Rhine-Westphalia state, told reporters at his party's headquarters in Bonn, the federal capital.

Despite pre-election polls predicting a strong win for Kohl, his Christian Democrats and their Bavarian sister party, the Christian Social Union received 44 percent, according to final projections reported by

West German television. The two parties received a combined 48.8 percent of the vote in 1983.

Kohl, speaking at his party's headquarters in Bonn, said the results for his Christian Democratic Union-Christian Social Union coalition were "gloomy and marked a painful loss."

"It is certainly disappointing, but we will not let ourselves be discouraged," said Christian Democratic chairman Heiner Geissler, also speaking at the party headquarters.

Kohl had been riding high in public opinion polls before Sunday's vote for parliament, buoyed by a healthy economy and an upbeat national mood.

He blamed some of the lost votes on rainy, cold weather that kept turnout low.

In the current Parliament, the Christian Democrats and their Bavarian sister party had 242 seats, the Social Democrats 193 seats, the Free Democrats 34 seats, and the Greens 26 seats. Three seats were held by independents.

Seats in the new Parliament will be apportioned according to the final election results.

Black activists freed after questioning

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Police took black activist Winnie Mandela and her daughter from their home in black township of Soweto Saturday, but released them after questioning Mandela for about 10 hours, her lawyer said.

The lawyer, Ismail Ayob, said Mandela told him afterward that questioning appeared to be "routine."

Ayob said that at about 5 p.m. police took Mandela from her home in the black township on the side of Johannesburg and returned an hour after that for Mandela's daughter, Zinzi.

Police also took a filing cabinet filled with documents belonging to Mandela, said Ayob. The cabinet was returned, and it did not appear that any documents had been taken, he said.

Mandela, wife of jailed anti-apartheid leader Nelson Mandela, is one of the nation's most outspoken anti-apartheid activists.

Reporters said she had delivered a powerful address at a general in Soweto Saturday night, a member of the outlawed African National Congress guerrilla movement.

President's opinion on proposal for health insurance unknown

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan is expected to talk about catastrophic health insurance in his State of the Union speech for his second straight year, but once again what he will say remains a mystery even to government health officials.

Health and Human Services Secretary Otis R. Bowen told a Senate panel Thursday that he did not know whether the president would embrace his proposal to provide catastrophic coverage for the elderly by increasing Medicare premiums about \$5 a month.

A department official said Bowen still did not know late Friday whether his proposal — which has won widespread support in Congress — would be made part of the president's speech.

The official, who discussed the issue on condition of not being identified by name, said the situation was reminiscent of last year when high-ranking HHS officials did not know

until Reagan delivered the speech whether he would follow department advice and discuss catastrophic health.

In that 1986 address, Reagan cited potentially devastating medical bills facing the elderly as a major national problem and instructed Bowen to seek solutions.

Bowen, a physician and former governor of Indiana, made his proposal public Nov. 20. Since then, he has been working to overcome resistance from others in the administration who argue that an expansion of Medicare to deal with catastrophic illness runs counter to the administration's philosophy of letting the private sector deal with any problem that does not absolutely require government intervention.

However, no potential alternatives to the Bowen plan have been put forth publicly, and the HHS official said that is one reason department leaders are optimistic Reagan

will line up behind the health secretary's suggestion.

Another reason, the official said, is that a tide of support in Congress suggests that a program at least based on the Bowen plan is likely to pass with or without White House support.

Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, Mass., chairman of the Labor-Human Resources Committee, said he will introduce the Bowen plan if the administration does not and at least two other bills would go further already have introduced.

Five hearings on catastrophic health care have been scheduled by various committees this week.

The Bowen plan calls for an additional \$4.92 a month in Medicare premiums to make up a portion of the cost of catastrophic health care with no tax money included — would insure recipients against paying more than \$2,000 in medical expenses in any year.
