State Senator says new bill may ease prison crowding

AUSTIN (AP) — The chairman of the Senate Criminal Justice Committee introduced a bill Thursday he said could help ease prison crowding, but legislative leaders said finding more money for Texas prisons remains the critical problem.

Top lawmakers said they still don't know where they will get the millions needed to make improvements ordered by a federal judge who has threatened to fine Texas \$24 million a month beginning April 1.

"We need several million dollars to try to take care of the prison system, (and) I still don't know where the money's going to come from," House Speaker Gib Lewis said.

Lewis, D-Fort Worth, said Republican Gov. Bill Clements is studying a proposal to temporarily lower the state's contributions to the Teacher Retirement System and generate an additional \$83 million for prisons.

Lawmakers and Clements aides said reducing state contributions to the teacher retirement fund for six months might provide enough money for Texas to escape the \$800,000 in daily fines threatened by U.S. District Judge William Wayne Justice over failure to implement prison reforms.

But almost as quickly as the idea surfaced, cries of protest were heard from teachers.

"This is a shameful proposal," declared John Cole, president of the Texas Federation of Teachers. "This is not the state's money, and the state ought to keep its hands off."

Cole said the state wouldn't have this problem if Clements had approved proposed prison construction during his first term.

"The state's retired teachers should not be asked to bail Governor Bill out of a jam caused by his own actions," Cole said. "If he had not vetoed a prison construction bill during his first term, we would be facing fines."

Sen. Bob McFarland, Dallas, Thursday offered a bill that could accomplish two key goals: keeping the inmate population low and making it easier to hire needed medical personnel for the prison system.

It also would create more probation and parole alternatives for up to 3,000 "low-risk" inmates who committed their crimes.

"Such low-risk inmates converted from IDC... to probation, which will include intensive supervision probation, intensive probation, house arrest, electronic maintenance and special caseloads for probation officers," McFarland said he estimated the total cost of the bill at about \$10 million.

Besides tapping the retirement fund, legislators are looking at other possibilities to maintain the extra prison money.

- Diverting some tax revenue to a dedicated prison fund, which ends Aug. 31.
- Transferring unspent money from other, so-far unspecified agencies. Clements asked the Legislature for authority to do this. Lawmakers say the plan is vetoed by the state's \$1 billion deficit.
- Using education trust funds to buy surplus state lands. Clements proposal, money for the Permanent School Fund would go for prison improvements.
