International cocaine smuggler held for leading large drug ring

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) — A neo-Nazi who allegedly vowed to "kill a federal judge a week" if arrested was brought under heavy guard before a federal magistrate Thursday on charges of heading the world's largest cocaine smuggling ring.

Carlos Lehder Rivas, who was seized by Colombian troops in his jungle hideout Wednesday and flown here by U.S. Air Force jet, was ordered held for a formal hearing Monday in Jacksonville, where he is under a 6-year-old indictment on drug and conspiracy charges.

Federal authorities refused to say where they would hold Lehder, a self-proclaimed Nazi, until Monday. He was escorted into court by four U.S. marshals and several other federal agents.

Lehder, 37, called by prosecutors a violent, billionaire drug smuggler who heads a private army and helps lead the "Medellin Cartel" smuggling group, asked for court-appointed counsel because he had no funds with him.

"Most of my assets are frozen by the government in Colombia," he told U.S. Magistrate Elizabeth Jenkins.

Lehder sat at the defense table in jeans, boots and a blue T-shirt inscribed "Cycling."

U.S. Attorney Robert Merkle pressed for Lehder's immediate detention, saying there had been death threats against a judge.

"That's a lie!" Lehder shouted in court. Merkle did not elaborate.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Ernest Mueller in Jacksonville said Lehder has said if he was caught "he would kill a federal judge a week until he is freed."

Meanwhile, Leon Kellner, U.S. Attorney in Miami, halted Lehder's extradition, and called for Colombia to round up other top drug dealers: Jorge Ochoa Vasquez, Pablo Escobar-Gaviria and Jose Rodriguez Gacha.

In a separate, sweeping Miami indictment, Lehder and the other three accused traffickers are accused of heading a ring responsible for 80 percent of the cocaine smuggled into the United States.

The ring is accused of murdering two Drug Enforcement Administration agents and bribing government

officials in furtherance of the conspiracy.

Also, the ring is accused of smuggling 58 tons of cocaine into the United States from laboratories scattered throughout the Amazon Basin.

Ana Barnett, spokesman for the U.S. Attorney's Office in Miami, said it was unclear whether Lehder eventually will be tried on the outstanding Miami indictments, or only on the narrower, 1981 Jacksonville indictment.

Latchkey children reported to number 2 million in U.S.

WASHINGTON (AP) — More than 2 million American youngsters spend at least some time unsupervised after school, with the largest share in white, upper income households, the Census Bureau reported Thursday.

Known as latchkey children, some 2,065,000 youngsters are left to care for themselves after school, the new study says.

That's about 7.2 percent of all youngsters aged 5 to 13, with the share in self-care smallest at the younger ages and increasing steadily with the age of the children involved.

These children have attracted wide attention in recent years, with rapid growth in the numbers of working mothers and women raising families on their own.

And indeed, the new study found that, overall, children of working mothers are more likely to be left alone either before or after school.

However, although black mothers were more likely to be working full time than white mothers, black households were less likely than white ones to leave children alone

Homosexuals told to avoid strangers after rash of killings

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Police and gay community leaders are urging homosexuals to avoid after-hours encounters with strangers following the slayings of eight homosexuals in the past 14 months.

"I think gays are subjected to a good deal of violence in this society and it almost always involves a stranger-to-stranger murder, which sends the whole community into fear," Police Chief Tony Bouza said.

Most of the dead men were found in their apartments, although one who frequently dressed in women's clothing was found on a bridge. In two cases, credit cards and videocassette recorders were taken, and in

two other cases, the victims were found stabbed to death in a burning apartment.

In one recent unsolved case, Dale E. Staupe, 28, was found dead in his apartment on Nov. 13, 1986. Staupe was from Eau Claire, Wis., about 80 miles from Milwaukee. His body was nude, hands and feet bound, a garrote around his neck, and his car was found in a parking lot in Superior, Wis.

Although suspects have been arrested and charged in three of the killings and police do not believe the other five are linked, men in the gay community still refer to "the murderer," according to Tim Campbell,

editor of the *GLC Voice*, a Twin Cities gay newspaper.

Jimmy Tiggas, owner of Cloud 9 Express, a downtown Minneapolis bar frequented by homosexuals, says there has been a noticeable change in behavior among his gay customers in the wake of the killings.

"It's similar to the outbreak of AIDS where people have a sense of fear," Tiggas said. "They have toned down their going home with strangers. It's unfortunate that a murder has to happen for them to do that."

Bouza, meanwhile, said the apparent increase in homosexual killings is not just occurring in Minneapolis.

Soviet tanks storm forts in Afghan

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan (AP) — Soviet tank columns with thousands of soldiers attacked Mujahideen guerrilla forts in eastern Afghanistan on Thursday as warplanes and artillery blasted the outnumbered insurgents, sources in Pakistan said.

Guerrilla officials and other sources reported a second day of fierce fighting in Pakia province with Soviet and Afghan government forces closing on key guerrilla bases close to the frontier.

An Afghan air force MIG-17 jet fighter-bomber was shot down by guerrilla anti-aircraft defenses Thursday and several other planes appeared to have been damaged, the officials said.

The attack was the first major action by Soviet forces since Afghanistan's government began a unilateral cease-fire Jan. 15. About 115,000 Soviet troops are in Afghanistan to back the Communist government.

Guerrilla officials said about 14,000 Soviet and Afghan troops, including several regiments of elite Soviet paratroopers and commandos, attacked the bases of the Zhawar area. Soviet tank columns spearheaded the ground assaults as waves of jets and helicopter gunships bombarded the guerrilla positions, they said.

Both sides suffered casualties but no precise figures were available, the officials said.
