'Chicken Ranch' museum proposal facing opposition

Although the phrase "Chicken Ranch" has aroused various emotions from many people, it has brought color, folklore and nationwide attention to La Grange.

The most recent arousal was ini-tiated by a proposal by Todd Hof-fman, president of The Original Chicken Ranch Inc., to sell 45 mil-lion square-inch plots of ground around the original site for \$8 each, build a two story measure to tell its build a two-story museum to tell its history, and stage an annual "Chicken Fest," which would feature well-known entertainers and special events, such as a barbecue cookoff, in hopes of raising \$600,000.

Hoffman says the ranch operated in the La Grange community unin-terrupted for more than 130 years until Marvin Zindler, a television journalist for Houston's KTRK tele-vision station, exposed the operation and forced its closing

and forced its closing. Hoffman's plan has met opposi-tion from two camps — the La Grange City-Council, led by Mayor Charlie Jungmichel, and the La Grange Ministerial Association, led by Monsignor Harry Mazurkiewicz.

In a recent statement, members of the ministerial association said they would not condone any attempt to glorify, memorialize or otherwise celebrate the ranch's existence.

The statement also said associa-tion members believed the purpose

of such economic gain was grounded in the same immoral choices that gave the community its reputation for exploitation of the sanctity of human life.

Hoffman and the thousands of property owners in The Original Chicken Ranch subdivision are asking Monsignor Mazurkiewicz why the Ranch's existence was never openly opposed when it was in full operation as a brothel.

Hoffman added that the church and the community accepted large donations from Edna Milton and Jessie Williams, the previous ma-dams of the Chicken Ranch.

Hoffman said his research has shown that Jungmichel was a state representative while the ranch was in full operation and that he made no attempts to shut down the "illegal and immoral operations" of the ranch. "I have made numerous attempts

to meet with the La Grange Ministerial Association and the La Grange City Council to answer any questions and discuss the plans for The Origi-nal Chicken Ranch," Hoffman said. "All of my attempts have been to no avail.

Plans for the re-opening of The Original Chicken Ranch have been successful despite the opposition, Hoffman said, with numerous organizations, companies and universi-ties involved with the sale of the plots.

Court: Custody law biased against men

AUSTIN (AP) — Fathers are discriminated against in cases involving Justice William Kilgarlin illegitimate children because state custody laws give mothers all rights to the child, the Texas Supreme Court ruled Wednesday.

The court ordered a new trial in a Wichita County case in which a fa-ther sued for custody of his son, who was born in 1983 to a woman to whom he wasn't married.

The father sued for custody when the mother offered the child for

adoption. The trial court upheld Laura Mc-Lean's right to offer the baby for adoption. That ruling was appealed by Billy Dean Wise, the father.

The Texas Court of Appeals in Fort Worth had upheld the trial court decision, saying, in most cases, state law gives a mother custody of an illegitimate child. According to the state law, "when a child is born to a woman not mar-ried to the child's father, she auto-matically excessions all of the rights

matically exercises all of the rights, duties and privileges of the parentchild relationship.

But the law says the father has those rights only if the mother agrees.

"A father . . . should not be re-quired to meet a higher burden of proof solely because he is male," Kilgarlin said.

In a separate opinion, Justices Raul Gonzalez and James Wallace said Wise should be given custody of his son without another trial.

"When the state is making great efforts to find absentee parents," Gonzalez said, "it's ironic that the state spends so much time and energy in denying a father . . . his law-ful rights as a parent."
