

Border drivers under siege from all sides

EL PASO (AP) — A police crackdown on drivers who dodge legal requirements netted 648 citations, and an official said Tuesday that motorists tired of smoke-belching vehicles can turn them in by calling a hotline.

The two efforts have drivers under siege in this border city, where the proximity to New Mexico and Mexico allows them to register their vehicles out-of-state or out of the country to avoid Texas' insurance or pollution laws.

Police Lt. George DeAngelis said, "We have people calling in and snitching on their neighbors."

"We reacted to the amount of complaints, people saying, 'My neighbors have two or three cars with Mexican license plates, and if they can get away with it, why can't I?'"

Residents of next-door Ciudad Juarez, Mexico, can cross over to El Paso to shop or work without having to show proof of insurance or comply with this city's strict pollution laws.

Every year, El Paso fails federal standards for carbon monoxide, and it is one of only four Texas cities where vehicles must pass muster on pollution-control devices.

Raul Munoz, director of the El Paso City-County Health District's environmental division, said motorists who see vehicles spewing smoke can report them to that office. Officials there check license plate numbers and send the vehicle's owner a letter stating the situation.

Owners have 30 days to repair their vehicles. After that, drivers are summoned before a municipal judge, who can issue fines up to \$200, Munoz said.

"Most of them repair their vehicles," Munoz said.

Sponsors drop requirement in abortion bill

AUSTIN (AP) — The House sponsor of a bill to regulate late-term abortions followed the lead of the Senate sponsor Monday and dropped from the measure a requirement that minors seeking abortions first obtain parental consent.

Rep. Mike Millsap, D-Fort Worth, said he regretted the move, but thought it was important to "avoid a potentially divisive conflict with the Senate."

The bill would prohibit late-term abortions except in medical emergencies.

Before introducing a similar bill in a Senate committee, Sen. Ted Lyon dropped the provision, saying he is a "political realist" and knew the bill would not be approved by the committee with the controversial provision.

The requirement was the center of a dispute last week when Gov. Bill Clements claimed it was a vital part of abortion legislation.

A&M department awaiting doctoral program's final OK

The Department of Political Science, anxiously awaiting final approval of a doctoral program to be initiated in Fall 1987, may get its wish Thursday.

Dr. Edward Portis, associate professor of political science, said the department began pursuing the doctor of philosophy program about five or six years ago. The department has been in the process of certification from the Texas Coordinating Board for Higher Education for four years.

In January, the board approved the department's request on the first of two mandatory readings. The second and deciding reading is scheduled for Thursday.

Even though the department doesn't officially have a doctoral program, it is accepting applications from students.

"I have no doubt the program will be approved because the coordinating board is very impressed with the department," Portis said.

The A&M political science department is one of the largest in the nation and, with the inclusion of a Ph.D. program, it may grow even more.

"This semester we have 40 master of public administration students and approximately 20 master of arts students," Portis said. "And we expected to add 10 doctoral students by the spring."

However, the addition of an expected 10 Ph.D. students will decrease the number of graduate assistantships available to master of arts students because of a limited budget, Portis said.

The assistants are part-time employees of A&M who help with teaching or researching and take a reduced load of classes — usually nine hours.

Dr. Charles Johnson, professor of political science, said graduate assistantships are kept for MPAs because the MPA is a terminal professional degree. The degree requires more hours and it prepares the students for public administration work.

Three of the master's students and graduate assistants plan to participate in the new program and praise the department.

Lydia Andrade, a master of arts student, said, "A&M is really coming in the world of political science. We are ranked first in the nation in publications and the department also has a good computer system, which is helpful in research."

Master of arts student Mark said, "Reputation is the name of the game."

"While A&M may not be known now, it has a very strong department and is well-known at other institutions like the University of Texas."

Robin Moore, a master of public administration student, said she is really impressed with the program here. And the department's reputation is growing along with the program.

Man attempts robbery to pay for pistol

ABILENE (AP) — A man needed \$300 to pay for his pistol, so he decided to get the money by using the weapon to rob a convenience store, police said.

But the man was arrested before ever leaving the store because he held up the hold-up while waiting for customers to do their business, officers said.

Clay Douglas Sanders, 24, of Abilene was held Tuesday in lieu of \$7,500 bond on a charge of aggravated robbery, said Justice of the Peace Clarence Collins.

Assistant District Attorney Melissa Annis said the man went to an Allsup's convenience store early Monday in an attempt to get money to pay for the pistol because he knew the store's clerk.

He asked the clerk to give him the money, but instead the clerk suggested the robber sell his truck to raise cash, Annis said. The robber didn't like the suggestion.

"It's serious enough to put a man in jail, but not serious enough to put a man in jail without transportation," the quoted the man as saying.

The robber then showed Sanders he had a gun stuffed in his belt and threatened to use it if Sanders didn't give him money, Annis said.

Three men came into the store before the clerk opened the cash register and the man waited for the clerk to leave before he renewed the demand for money. That gave the clerk time to trip a silent alarm.
