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Spectators begin own boxing match at 11th Fight Night

The audience at the 11th annual Fight Night, sponsored by the Sigma Phi Epsilon fraternity, was treated to an extra dose of jabs and punches in the third round of the fraternity division heavyweight championship when two overzealous spectators began their own boxing match.

Emotions and tempers were strong as the crowd chanted for their favorite fighters, but when the dust settled and the chants ceased, two teams emerged victorious — the Texas A&M Boxing Club white team in the open division and the Kappa Alpha-Phi Delta Theta team in the fraternity division.

Six teams fought in the open division and eight teams fought in the fraternity division, said Don Sautstad, Fight Night chairman.

Each team consisted of four or five people in five different weight categories. Individual fighters received trophies for first and second places and teams received trophies for first, second and third places.

The open division featherweight champion, Jerry Valle, has fought in Fight Night for three years and has won twice. The senior aerospace engineering major is a member of the boxing club white team.

"This year's competition was tough and better in comparison to last year's Fight Night," Valle said.

Bart Askew, the fraternity lightweight division runner-up and a member of the Beta Theta Pi team, said he had never participated in Fight Night before.

"I've never fought before, but I enjoyed it," he said. "It made me feel good to fight — like I was accomplishing something to be able to fight and win."

Preliminary fights began Friday and final matches concluded Saturday at about 12:30 a.m.

Although Fight Night lasts only two days for spectators, it is a year-long activity for Sigma Phi Epsilon, which sponsors the event.

Sautstad is in charge of advertising, boxing equipment, health and general crowd liability insurance, facility reservations and team organization. He also makes sure food, drinks and medical assistance are provided at Fight Night.

The Texas A&M Emergency Care Team provided medical assistance at the event to ensure fighter safety.

Dave Holland, emergency medical technician, said, "We are here for anyone who gets knocked out or who needs first aid. We have oxygen and a first aid kit. We also call an ambulance if it is necessary."

Holland said there were no major injuries — just a few bloody noses.

"The reason no one gets hurt is because the referees are so good," he said. "They won't allow the fight to continue if someone is hurt."

Sautstad said one expense Sigma Phi Epsilon did not have this year was alcohol liability insurance because its national organization doesn't allow it to serve alcohol at fraternity functions.

Although most spectators said they would like to drink at Fight Night, the lack of alcohol didn't seem to hurt ticket sales or attendance, which totaled about 2,600 for both nights.

Bryan Vanderpool, Fight Night ring chairman, said, "We were not anticipating 500 people each night but 1,400 came Friday night. I was little surprised that crowd participation was so good due to the fact that we couldn't sell beer, but I do think beer made a big difference in attendance."

But Jay Clark, a senior civil engineer major, said he wanted to drink beer at Fight Night.

"I think Fight Night is still fun but it would be nice to stand around and watch my buddies fight with a cold beer in my hand," he said.

Other attractions at Fight Night included pillow fights by sorority teams and a taekwon do exhibition.

The Kappa Kappa Gamma team won the pillow fight championship for the second year.

Vicky Russell, an exercise technology major, said, "I volunteered because I am a freshman and didn't know what to expect. It was great and I had a lot of fun."

Concrete counterweights lead to crane accident

DALLAS (AP) — Massive concrete blocks atop a construction crane apparently swung out of control and toppled the structure, killing three workmen and injuring its operator, federal safety officials said.

The blocks weighed between 50,000 and 70,000 pounds and served as counterweight on the shorter, base end of the crane arm, officials said. Removal of an 80-foot segment from the arm's front end caused the structure to become unbalanced.
