Police find sandy grave with 2 bodies

OLTON (AP) — Autopsies were ordered on the bodies of two men unearthed from a sandy grave after a search-party horse stopped at the spot and refused to budge, authorities said.

The two, who had apparently been shot to death, were identified as Robert Almanza Jr., 29, and Jaime Arredondo, 22, both of Olton, according to Lamb County Sheriff E.D. McNeese.

Charged with capital murder in the deaths are Robert Leon Blunk, 23, and Kevin Wade Hudson, 21, both of Muskogee, Okla., McNeese said. They were arraigned Monday and held in Lamb County Jail in lieu of \$150,000 bond each.

Authorities have determined no motive for the slayings since the bodies were found Monday south of Olton, which is about 50 miles northwest of Lubbock.

McNeese and Lamb County District Attorney Curtis Wilkinson said authorities had been searching for the victims since Sunday after an informant reported that two Hispanic men had been killed.

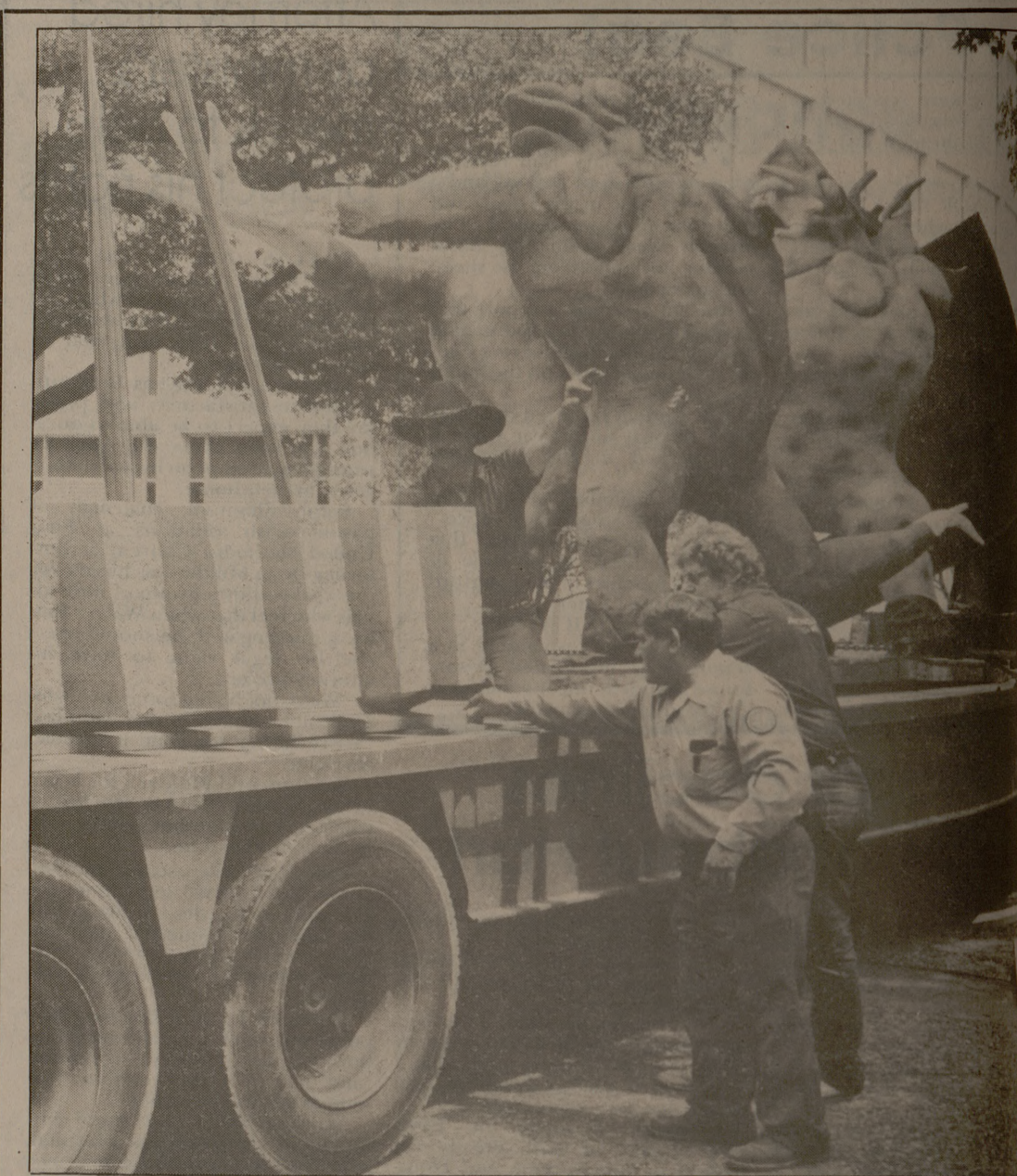
A sheriff's deputy on horseback discovered the grave in a sandy, isolated area about seven miles south of Olton when his horse stopped at the site and refused to move, Wilkinson said.

"Really, the horse discovered the grave," he said.

The deputy noticed an area of sand that appeared to have been turned. The lawman also observed a branch with dead leaves protruding from the sand, he said.

Authorities digging at the site uncovered a first victim about 3 feet underground, Wilkinson said. The second man was found about a foot below the first, he said.

McNeese called the discovery of the bodies "a miracle."

Senators to debate tort reform compromise

AUSTIN (AP) — Texas senators were told Tuesday they have a good — but not perfect — compromise before them on tort reform, and the frequently postponed debate is scheduled today.

"This is a very far-reaching piece of legislation, done carefully and deliberately," Houston attorney Joe Jammal told a Senate briefing session Tuesday. "It is a compromise, but it

is not perfect."

Numerous amendments are to be offered to the package of measures negotiated by Sens. John Montford, Kent Caperton and O.H. "Ike" Harris, with the help of several prominent lawyers.

"This is a very reasonable bill, and I highly recommend it to you," said Harris, R-Dallas, chairman of the Senate Economic Development

Committee, which held hearings on the measure.

Mike Gallagher of Houston represented plaintiff attorneys in the compromise talks, and Morris Atlas of McAllen represented defense attorneys.

Negotiations began after a year-long study by a Senate-House committee of the so-called crisis in liability insurance. Some blame inflated

premiums on big court settlements in personal injury cases, while claim insurance firms are greedy.

Montford has led the move in the Senate to revise civil justice forms that would make it more difficult for plaintiffs to collect judgments in personal injury cases.

Caperton has negotiated in defense of current laws.
