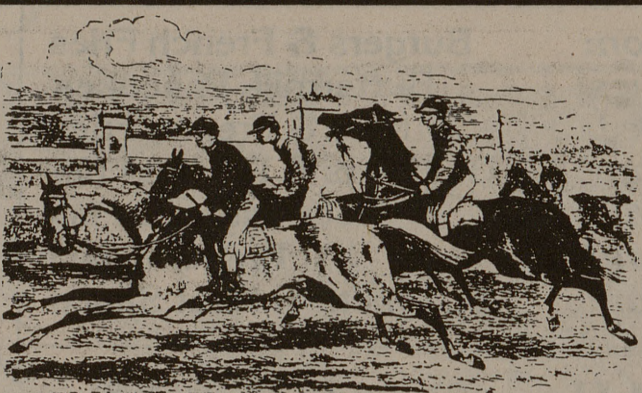

Retarded adults get shelter, work at nearby facility

What was once just a small log cabin in a beautiful rural setting a few miles east of Hearne now is the Black Jack Ranch, a facility operated by the Mental Health Mental Retardation Authority of Brazos Valley, where nine mentally retarded adults live and work together.

"They get along great," says Bob Charlton, unit director for the facility. "They do the chores around here. Of course, they're closely supervised."

Janie Velasquez, director of volunteer services for the MHRM Authority, speaks proudly about the success of the facility.

"Black Jack was purchased specifically for a mentally retarded residential facility," she says. "Basically, it rooms 10 clients. Right now we have nine. I think it's important for these clients to have such a relaxed atmosphere."

The two-story ranch house, situated on a sparsely wooded six-acre plot, has been expanded around the original log cabin. The interior walls of bare logs add to the rustic atmosphere. Charlton grins when he talks about the pond, which is visible through the windows in the back of the house.

"While the place was being remodeled last year," he says, "we had a guy come out from (Texas) A&M with electronic gear to check our pond. We wanted to see if it should be restocked. He said it was one of the most well-stocked ponds he had checked in months. There are eight and 10-pound catfish in there."

For the \$200 a month they pay to live at Black Jack, clients get total care, Velasquez says.

"They get a room, supervision, medication; it's like having everything in one package," she says, adding that laundering equipment and transportation are provided.

To help clients with payments and

provide a sense of fulfillment, Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation employs clients at a workshop in Hearne where they manufacture goods for local businesses. Through its long contract, with Price Barricade Hearne, the workshop produces road signs used by the Texas Department of Highways and Transportation.

Velasquez says the ranch and workshop are mutually dependent.

"If you didn't have the MR mental," she says, "then you wouldn't have the employees for shelter workshop."

The remodeling of the ranch house to meet strict specifications was not an easy task, Velasquez says.

"Everything is built according to standards... a certain height, a certain width, a certain everything to meet standards," she says. "You had to put up with city standards, TDMHMR standards and MR mental facility standards."

Because of the vast number of requirements — over 1,700 — audits often find deficiencies, she says.

"Some (in the community) don't understand the number of standards we have to meet," she says, asking them if they would like to ask in my office to let me show you how many we have to meet — no money. We really don't have money for remodeling, to buy furniture, to buy all the safety equipment. We just have to squeeze that in."

Regional groups offer final site proposals for collider project

AUSTIN (AP) — More than a dozen regional groups presented their final pitches Tuesday to state officials looking for the best place in Texas for the multibillion-dollar supercollider project.

Proposals were filed by groups representing all corners of the state, including big cities and small cities.

"They all believe they have quality sites and I believe that is true," said Edward Binger, executive director of the Texas National Research Laboratory Commission, which will select a Texas site to propose to federal officials. "Texas is very fortunate... that we have a number of sites that are very high quality."

He said the commission could decide to recommend more than one Texas site. The panel's decision will be announced Aug. 3 and federal officials are scheduled to pick the site by July 1988.

The supercollider will include a 52-mile tunnel that will be used for high-energy physics research. The project could create 4,500 construction jobs in the region that gets it.

As the final proposals were filed Tuesday, the Texas House approved a proposed constitutional amendment allowing the sale of \$500 million in general obligation

bonds to cover expenses that would be related to the project. The proposed amendment now goes to the Senate, where approval would be on the November general election ballot.

Rep. Al Luna, D-Houston, said he thought that this bonding authority going to be the backbone of the proposal that Texas submits to the department of Energy.

Fourteen proposals were submitted to the Texas National Research Laboratory Commission shortly before the deadline.

A South Texas group, which includes Nueces and Kleberg counties and surrounding areas, said the most significant feature of its proposal was a possible donation of land from owners of the King and Queen man ranches.

The group is proposing a site of Kingsville and south of Corpus Christi.

Assembling the South Texas was made easier by information about the area that was gathered when Corpus Christi bid for a homeport, Steve Altman, group president, said.

"There's more known about land than anywhere else in the state," Altman said.
